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## PREFACE

After a distinguished academic career, Mr. R. S. Shelvankar, M.A., was appointed to one of the Research Studentships in this Department in 1930, and he spent the next two years preparing his work on 'Tanjore under the Marathas', 1676-1799 A. D. In the course of his study of the Marathi records in the Saraswati Mahal Library in Tanjore, he came across the twenty-seven bundles of Modi manuscripts which were briefly noticed in the Administration Report of the Tanjore Library for 1929---30. At a very early stage of his study of these manuscripts, Mr. Shelvankar discovered that they had little direct bearing on the main subject of his work as only one out of the twenty-seven bundles related to the period before 1800. Considering, however, the general interest of these manuscripts to students of later Maratha history in the South and the attention drawn to them in the Patna session of the Indian Historical Records Commission, I requested Mr. Shelvankar to prepare a descriptive report on the contents of the twenty-seven bundles, accompanied by illustrative extracts and translations. Mr. Shelvankar has done the work with commendable accuracy and judgment, and I venture to hope that the report will be found useful to scholars interested in the subject-matter of these manuscripts.

This report, it will be seen, belies the somewhat exaggerated expectations often expressed of the antiquity

and the historical value of the Modi manuscripts of Tanjore. There is nothing here calculated to throw any fresh light on the origin or the early history of the Tanjore Maratha kingdom. But Mr. Shelvankar has inspected all, and studied most, of the manuscripts in the Tanjore library and he assures me that besides the large collection dealt with in this report, there is only one considerable manuscript in Modi script; it is the *Rājanīti*, a manuscript dated Oct. 9, 1705 A. D., a general treatise on polity. It is possible that in the future some other scholar, more lucky than Mr. Shelvankar, may bring to light records of greater value than these; but it is something meanwhile to have determined the exact nature and value of the Tanjore collection of Modi manuscripts at present known.

Dr. N. Venkataramanayya kindly calculated the English equivalents of the Persian dates in the extracts.

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The 27 bundles of Mōḍī<sup>1</sup> manuscripts that are now preserved in the Tanjore Maharaja Sarfoji's Saraswati Mahāl Library were till recently in the archives of the District Court of Tanjore. They were transferred to their present place on the representation of M.R.Ry. Rao Saheb T. Sambamurti Rao Avl., B.A., B.L., that they could be preserved in the Saraswati Mahāl more usefully and without any inconvenience to the parties to the palace suit that was then pending before the District Judge.

The Records cover over a century of Tanjore History, the earliest bundle relating to the death of Pratāpa Simha, in 1763 A.D., and the latest being a return of Mokāsā estates as in 1887. Next in point of time to the former bundle is the one of 1801 A.D. on the Rājā's military forces, so that 26 out of the 27 bundles

belong to the period subsequent to 1800 A.D. and are undoubtedly of use to the historian of that period.

There is no uniformity in the method of dating the records. No fewer than five systems of dating are employed, the Arabic, the Śaka, the cyclic, the Tamil and the English, and the manuscripts are dated according to any one or more of these systems indifferently.

The manuscripts can roughly be classified into those relating to the Judicial, Military, Civil and Financial administrative systems and those that deal with miscellaneous subjects like the Rājā's death, marriages in the royal household, regulations regarding the conduct of nautch parties, Śarabhōji's pilgrimage to Benares, the Saraswati Mahāl Library, and accounts relating to the construction of drains in Tanjore.

#### *Judicial Administration.*

There were four different courts with separate establishments; the "Nyāya Sabhā" dealt with criminal cases, the "Mudrita Sabhā" with civil cases, the "Dharma Sabhā" with religious litigation and temple cases, roughly answering to our Hindu Religious Endowments Board, and the "Nyāyādhīśa Sabhā" or "Pratiṣṭhita Sabhā" which was the court of appeal from the three other courts. Certain kinds of cases went into the office of the "*Dāpana Kartā*"<sup>2</sup> an officer attached to each of the four courts, whose duty, it seems, was the execution of the Court's decrees.<sup>3</sup> The "*Dimati*" was the officer who

signed the court's decree ordering the payment of the amount in suit to the successful litigant,<sup>4</sup> while the "*Harkāra*" seems to have been in charge of the attendance registers of each court.<sup>5</sup>

The reports of cases and their disposals and other similar office papers bear the signature of the "*Phaḍnavīs*".<sup>6</sup>

Inclusive of the officials noted above, the establishments numbered 17 in the "Nyāya Sabhā", 34 in the "Mudrita Sabhā", 15 in the "Dharma Sabhā" and 17 in the "Nyāyādhīśa Sabhā". The large number of officials of the "Mudrita Sabhā" perhaps indicates the existence of a comparatively larger number of civil cases than those which came under any of the two other classes. Each court was presided over by an "*Adhyakṣa*".<sup>7</sup> Attendance in these courts was taken twice a day, once at 12 noon and again at 3 P.M., to note the late-comers. Every month an abstract of all partial and full absentees during the month was prepared for the purpose of checking their pay bills.

Accurate statements were prepared every day regarding the number of cases in arrears, the number taken up and disposed of during the course of the day, and other similar details. Each such statement contained the number of the suit, a brief summary of the case and the judgment awarded, along with the name, address,

father's name, caste and occupation of each of the plaintiffs and defendants.<sup>8</sup>

As regards the hearing of the case itself, lawyers were conspicuous by their absence. The plaintiff and defendant appeared in person before the judges and presented their case. Any documentary evidence that they could adduce was also admitted. After fully hearing both sides of the case, the judgment was awarded.<sup>9</sup> An intended appeal by the losing party was no bar to the "Dāpana Kartā" proceeding to execute the lower court's decree, nor did any such appeal lie, until and unless the defendant-appellant first deposited the decreed amount in the court.<sup>10</sup> In the case of parties resident outside Tanjore, the execution of the court's decree seems to have lain in the hands of the sub-divisional officer called "*Madhyastha*".<sup>11</sup>

Having paid the court-fees the suitor could not claim refund on any account.

The punishments which these courts could award included rigorous imprisonment, fines, corporal punishment and deportation from the limits of the fort. Yet another kind of punishment was to take the accused in a mock procession through the four main streets of the city, with beat of tom-toms, and to inflict corporal punishment in the locality where the alleged offence was committed. Even abettors were dealt with, though the punishment was lighter in their case. In the case of theft of a “Tāmbyā” or “chombu” worth a rupee, the accused confessed his guilt and pointed out the pawn-broker, Namaśivāya Chetty with whom he had pawned it, the culprit himself received ten days’ rigorous imprisonment and six stripes, while the abettor was let off with a fine of annas eight.<sup>13</sup>

#### *Military Administration.*

Bundle No. 22 which treats of military matters consists of (a) muster rolls or lists of names of persons in service, checked every quarter, (b) daily roster of duties, (c) guard reports of the day officer, (d) daily cash balances of units and monthly cash accounts, and (e) acquittance rolls showing the disbursement of

salaries. All these relate to the year 1801 A.D., when the Rājā's military forces consisted of 303 persons, divided into two companies of 178 and 125 respectively, at a cost for each company of Rs. 702-8-0 and Rs. 480-2-0 respectively. The smallness of the force is explained by the fact that after the treaty of 1799 by which the kingdom, with the exception of the fort and its precincts, was ceded to the British, the Rājā's forces were not required for the defence of the realm but only for show and sundry personal services, and for this the small number sufficed.

The disparity between the total cost of maintaining the force as given in the beginning and the total arrived at after adding each separate item in the detailed list (*vide* Abstract for Bundle No. 22) is inexplicable. The highest paid officer was the "Śrīmant" on a salary of Rs. 60 per month, while the 200 privates were paid at the rate of Rs. 3-6-0 per month, the 53 gunners at Rs. 4-2-0 per month, the 5 buglers at Rs. 4-0-0 per month, the 7 fifiers at Rs. 4-14-0 per month, and the 2 cymbals at Rs. 5-4-0 per month.

There is also a small bundle on drill instructions,<sup>14</sup> which seems to have served as a sort of hand-book to the drill sergeants of the time. Many of the words of command found therein, such as "vāma parat" (left turn), "sthīra" (halt), "uttiṣṭhā" (stand), "yathāsthita" (as you were), "samviśa" (sit), are obviously Sanskrit translations of the corresponding English words of command. Besides these ordinary commands, there are a few queer ones such as "Kukkuṭāsana ṭhāṇ", "Vīrāsana ṭhāṇ", "Hanumantāsana ṭhāṇ", which students of

military organisation and technique will find extremely interesting.

*Civil Administration.*

What strikes one after a careful study of these Mōḍī manuscripts is the retention by the Tanjore Marāṭhās of the original sixteen Kārkhānās and twelve Mahāls, each under a superintendent, called "*Dimati*". Above the Dimatis was the *Sarkhēl*. It will be noticed that of these two sets of departments, Kārkhānās and Mahāls, the Kārkhānās were more intimately connected with the state proper than the mahāls which were, more or less, departments in the Royal Household; "Thaṭṭī mahāl", (cowsheds); "Vahilī mahāl", (chariots); "Kōṭhī mahāl", (stores); etc.

There was no lack of "red-tape" in the Secretariat offices of the Tanjore Rājās in the first half of the 19th century. Every paper must be presented to the Rājā, only through the departmental head, and with his, and in some cases, with the Sarkhēl's endorsement, if any, and the Rājā's orders, before execution, must receive the counter-signature of the Sarkhēl. It was also decided in an interview between the Rājā and the Resident, on 28th April, 1824, that the servants of the Rājā, except the Sarkhēl, should have no correspondence with the officials of the Residency,<sup>15</sup> and breaches of this regulation were taken very serious notice of.

The central offices in the fort were open daily between 10 A.M. and 8 P.M., when all the clerks and other Government servants were expected to be at their work. French leave was severely penalised, and no one could

absent himself in anticipation of leave being granted. In the case of servants granted leave, they were required to provide substitutes in their places during the period of their absence. It was also laid down that no clerk or other officer was to leave the offices before the Sarkhēl. Among the officials and servants who were required to leave one deputy or substitute in their place from sunrise to 8 at night were the “*Niṣindē*”, “*Sabnis*”, “*Lihīṅār*”, “*Kārūkūn*”, “*Kaṇakupillē*”, “*Jamadār*”, “*Gollar*”, “*Kōṭhivālā*” as well as the “*Baṅka Nāik*”, apparently the commandant of the Palace Guard. He seems to have in a way combined in himself the duties of a private secretary to the Rājā, for it was he, the “*Baṅka Nāik*”, who looked to the reception of guests and visitors to the royal palace. In Pratāpa Simha’s “*Sītākalyāṇa Nāṭaka*” he is referred to also as the “*Dauvārika*”, which seems to indicate that he was something of a glorified gate-keeper. One of the bundles<sup>16</sup> contains about 18 sub-bundles, all of them dealing with the general administration of the kingdom. The general nature of each of these sub-bundles is indicated below:—

Sub-bundle No. 2.—Returns of “*Mukāsā*” villages for 1887 A.D.

Sub-bundle No. 3.—Accounts, during the time of Kāmākṣi Ambā Bāi Sāhēb; contingent and miscellaneous expenses; 1864 A.D.

Sub-bundle No. 4.—List of gardens and estates granted as sarvamānyams to certain palace officers.

Sub-bundle No. 5.—List of “*Mukāsā*” estates (in Tamil), date, 1885 A.D.

Sub-bundle No. 6.—Miscellaneous reports relating to the Dēvasthānam under the Palace, Śaka 1772.

Sub-bundle No. 7.—Same as No. 3 above for 1863 A.D.

Sub-bundle No. 8.—Reports and accounts of Palace establishments in Āvu-Sāhēb-bāg, Rāmnāthpūr, Gaṇapati agrahāra and Paḷḷakalatūr.

Sub-bundle No. 9.—List of lease-holders as on 1st July, 1866.

Sub-bundle No. 10.—Expenses connected with the obsequies of Sagunā Bāi Sāhēb.

Sub-bundle No. 11.—Sale accounts of stamp papers in Śaka 1753.

Sub-bundle No. 12.—Accounts of “Sulakṣaṇām-bāpūr agrahār”.

Sub-bundle No. 13.—Repairs to Palace buildings.

Sub-bundle No. 14.—Accounts relating to the Gardens on the Veṅṅār bank, 1869 A.D.

Sub-bundle No. 15.—Reference from the Palace Kārbhāri Kṛṣṇāji to the several mahāls.

Sub-bundle No. 16.—List of documents relating to estates purchased for ‘Śrī Maṅgalavāsa”.

Sub-bundle No. 17.—Sanad, by Śivāji Mahārājā, granting certain lands to the temple of Śrī Kēśava-suta”, Śaka 1762 Śārvarī.

Sub-bundle No. 18.—Rājā Śarabhōji II’s pilgrimage to Benares.

*Revenue and Finance.*

After a close examination of the papers it has not been possible to pick out more than a few names of

officers connected with the administration of revenue and finance. The "*Daftari*" kept an accurate account of the revenue demand, the actual collections and arrears; a report was sent to the Rājā every day. He was expected to furnish the *Sarkhēl* with statistics and expert advice when required. In the sub-divisions of the kingdom, the "*Madhyastha*" acted as the agent of the Government, with certain minor officers like the "*Nisindē*", "*Sabnis*", "*Harkār*" and "*Pāharēvālā*" under him.

How far the practice obtained of securing the previous sanction of the *Sarkhēl* for every single item of expenditure is not ascertainable. But there is at least one instance of a "*Madhyastha*" requesting the *Sarkhēl*'s sanction for some expected expenditure in connection with the gardens in his charge.<sup>16</sup>

The cash accounts in Bundle No. 27 refer to the "*Kharçpōta*" or the spending treasury, the Revenue treasury and Reserve funds being kept separately. Ordinarily the reserve funds were not drawn upon; but when in emergencies it was found necessary either to draw on the reserve funds or to arrange for the transfer of grants from one department to another, it could be done only with the authorisation of the "*Paravānika*".

An estimate of income and expenditure was prepared for each year in advance, to which usually the actual expenditure tended to conform. In cases where the actual expenditure exceeded the amount sanctioned, a number of detailed statements were prepared to show clearly the items for which the excess expenditure was incurred, and the exact excess amount that was found necessary for the efficient administration of the depart-

ment. There were also regular audits of accounts and verification of balances in the several mahāls.<sup>17</sup>

Bundle No. 23 consists of a dozen sub-bundles almost all of which are statements of accounts relating to the several departments of the state. In detail, sub-bundle No. 1 is an account of expenditure from "*Jirāt Khānā*" for December, 1863 A.D.:

Sub-bundles Nos. 2 and 3.—Recoveries of rent from the palace gardens.

Sub-bundle No. 4.—"*Thaṭṭimahāl*"; returns of milch cattle for Śaka 1777, Rākṣasa; also accounts concerning fodder, etc.

Sub-bundle No. 5.—"*Ain-jinasi-mahāl*"; accounts for Śaka 1777.

Sub-bundle No. 6.—"*Sarbat Khānā*"; receipts and issues of drinks, etc.

Sub-bundle No. 7.—"*Kōḥī*"; miscellaneous articles.

Sub-bundle No. 8.—"*Ain-jinasi-mahāl*"; accounts for Suhur-san-samān-maiya-tain-alaph. (A. H. 1208.)

Sub-bundles Nos. 9, 10, 10-A and 10-B.—*Jāmdār Khānā*; receipts and issues of clothing for Śaka 1744.

Besides these, there is one big miscellaneous bundle containing reports from "*Rājmahāl*", "*Imārati Mahāl*", "*Pāgā*" and "*Vahili Mahāl*" and a few reports from the "*Madhyasthas*" of certain palace villages and gardens.

#### *Miscellaneous.*

Five bundles<sup>18</sup> are mostly concerned with the accounts of '*Jāmdār Khānā*' which, according to

Dr. S. N. Sen, was "a public treasury containing all sorts of things".<sup>19</sup> That it was something capable of more accurate definition, as shown in the *Rājavyavahāra-kōśa*, is confirmed by the practice that obtained in Marāṭhā Tanjore. The 'Jāmdār Khānā' was a huge wardrobe receiving and issuing 'Lugaḍī', (sarees), 'Sāḍyā', 'Ciraḍyā', 'Uttariya', (upper clothes or angavastrams), 'Dupaḷ', 'Jhagē', 'Cōgē', etc., for which regular accounts were maintained. The papers relating to the 'Jakāyati mahāl' are authorisations from the 'Parvānika' for the issue of sundry stores on specific occasions, (*e.g.*), fans and umbrellas to the Brahmins following the deity in the car festival of God Bṛhadīśvara.<sup>20</sup>

There is a paper in Bundle No. 1, which was a declaration issued by Pratāpa Simha and dated 'Suhur-sanbakab-ardain nayā-alaph', (A.H. 1208) to the Brahmins of Samudra Agrahāram, to confirm the grant of the said village by his predecessor. The motive of such grants was to encourage the rise of agrahāras or Brahmin settlements on the route to Rāmēśvaram. Extra grants of lands were made for '*Dvādaśi kaḷlā*' for Brahmins and for the opening of water *pandals*. This renewal of a former grant bears the signature of Narasinga Rao Ānanda Rao Pēshwā, who was a grandson of Nṛsimha Rāya Makhi and son of Ānanda Rāya Makhi, *alias* Ānanda Rao Pēshwā, who died of gangrene in 1733. Nṛsimha Rāya Makhi and his brothers Tryambak Rao and Bhagavanta Rao were the sons of Gangādhara Makhi, who was minister to Ēkōji, the first of the Tanjore Marāṭhā dynasty. Gangādhara's sons and grandsons were, besides

themselves being learned and scholarly, liberal and enthusiastic patrons of Literature and Arts. For very nearly a century members of this family did signal service to the Tanjore Bhonsles in the capacity of ministers and generals. They were Citpāvan Brahmins of the Abhyankar family. A list is given in Bundle No. 8 of the different coins that were presented to Tuḷajā Rājā on his coronation, while Bundle No. 10 consists of papers relating to the deaths of Pratāpa Simha, Tuḷajā and Śarabhōji. The dates of their deaths are given in the Arabic or Hindusthani, Śaka and cyclic years, as also the expenses connected with the funeral ceremonies of each of them, (*c.g.*), the funeral expenses of Śarabhōji II, for fifteen days, came to only Rs. 1,582-13-6. References are also made to the deaths of 'Saidāmbā Bāi Sāhēb, Mōhanā Bāi, Bhavānī Bāi, Pārvatī Bāi, Draupadī Bāi, Sulakṣaṇā Bāi and Annapūrṇā Bāi'.

The other papers in the bundle deal with the funerals of several Rājās and a few 'Vajārat-māph' nobles. Each set of papers contains instructions issued to the several departments, dealing with cash, honours, carriages, provisions, etc.

Records connected with Śarabhōji II's pilgrimage to Benares and the question of the succession of prince Śivāji lie scattered in two of the bundles.<sup>21</sup> Śarabhōji left Tanjore on 23rd September, 1820 A.D., on his pilgrimage to the holiest of holy cities, Benares, and returned to Tanjore on 24th April, 1822 A.D. He seems to have proceeded by stages of not more than 16 miles. His route to Benares lay through Kāṭṭumannārguḍī, Tiruttāni, Nāyuḍupēṭā, Peddāpur, Anakāpalle, Vijayanagar and

Jagannāth or Pūri. We come across long lists of relatives and friends who received the party at the Venṅār, on their return, and the list of Benares clothes that they had brought with them for purposes of presentation.

On his way back from Benares, Śarabhōji II sought, by a letter, dated 14th January, 1822, from his camp at Nagpur, the approval of the Governor-General for the succession of his son Śivāji to the Tanjore Gādi. Three days after writing the letter, (*i.e.*, on 17th January, 1822), he had an interview with Mr. Jenkins, Resident at Nagpur, regarding the training that the young prince was to receive; but the interview seems to have been infructuous, for the Resident's suggestion that young Śivāji should receive his training in England was not acceptable to Śarabhōji.

The 'Sarasvati Mahāl' is the subject of two of the bundles.<sup>22</sup> In its premises were occasionally conducted *Japa* and *Pūjā* of navagraha. *Hōma* and special *santarpana* were also performed in it; the *mahāl* was used for *śānti* purposes on occasions. There are among these papers, records relating to the Navīnavidyā-kalā-nidhi-śālā, Inḡraī Śālā and Śāstriya Śālā with the names of the students on their rolls and the expenses incurred.<sup>23</sup> A whole bundle of papers<sup>24</sup> constitutes the accounts connected with the construction of a drainage system for the fort area, in the years 1825-1827 A.D.

There are a few records in Bundle No. 3 which are of a somewhat peculiar interest. They are the regulations dated 1820 A.D. governing the sartorial equipment of the court dancing girls. They were forbidden to wear 'Candramā, ḷhānga ṭilā and pān paṭya; silk tape and 'Gōṇḍē' for their 'Vēṇīs' or pig tails; or 'Kusumbi nāḍā', 'Cimcpāṇī tuyā' for their heads. The 'Kumkum' or 'abīr' on their foreheads was not to be crosswise. They could not wear sarees to which 'nagadā jhālar' or 'nagadā' flower designs were sewn, nor were they allowed to put on 'rākhaḍīs' with golden "rāvē". Only a coloured shawl was to be worn about their shoulders, and no white cloth was to find a place there. Ordinarily they were forbidden the use of 'Pālkhī, Vahilī or ḍōlī'; in cases of illness they could, with previous permission, ride in a 'ḍōlī'. The *mōḍī* dance with bagpipes must not be performed without the permission of the Darbār obtained beforehand, while the Naṭṭuvans were required to wear their upper cloth 'Uṭṭariya' round their waists and were expressly prohibited from covering their chests and shoulders with them.

Exemption from all these restrictions was made in a solitary instance in 1828 A.D. The favoured one was a dancing-girl by name Sundarī. She and her representatives in the line, after her, were to receive Rs. 15 per dance, while among the jewels presented to her constituting a special honour, were—

"Cānda-śisa phūl, pān-paṭṭī, jhurmōlyā bhāṅga ṭilā, jaḍita tōḍē, mohapa sarjācā dēkhīl."

Her heirs and herself, as long as she lived, were to receive a shawl and Rs. 20 cash as presents on every Vijaya-Daśami day. To her also belonged the unique

privilege of performing the first dance on the following days:—

‘Guḍyācā pāḍvā’,

‘Navarātri’,

..

‘Dīpāvalī’, and

‘Saṁkrānti’.

Memoranda of articles issued from the ‘Jāndār Khānā for presentation to the staff that accompanied Munro on his visit to Tanjore are to be found in some papers,<sup>25</sup> dated ‘Suhur-san-isnē-salā-sain-mayā-tain-alaph’, (A.H. 1232), while there is in bundle No. 16, a notification, dated 9th April, 1823, Tiruvālūr, under the signature of the Collector, John Cotton, Esq., regarding the sale of the right of collecting sugar duties and some taxes on tobacco and betel leaves. The visit of the Ahōbala Jiyar to Tanjore and his stay in the city from the 2nd to 29th ‘Jilhēd’ (Zilhijja ?) in ‘Suhur-san-salā sain-mayā-tain-alaph’ (A.H. 1230), or Śaka 1751, ‘Virōdhi’, answering to 1829-30 A.D., are referred to in one of the records of bundle No. 3, which sets out the different kinds of honours and special privileges that were to be bestowed on particular occasions.

A sub-bundle consisting of private papers has been inadvertently mixed up among these records.<sup>26</sup> Most of them are private letters, dated October, 1838 A.D., from Hari Cakrapāṇī, *Madhyastha* of Tiruvādi, to his father Bāvāji Rāmāji Paṇḍit.
