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AGRA UNIVERSITY.

The members of the various Bodies of the University hold office for three years. The terms of old members expired on November 2, 1933, and consequently fresh members were elected or nominated for the triennium commencing from November 3, 1933. An humble beginning has been made by providing two Research studentships of Rs. 50 per mensem each, tenable at colleges affiliated to the University. One of the research studentships for the year goes to an Arts graduate and the other to a Science graduate. The Executive Council has also awarded a stipend to one of its distinguished graduates, who is carrying on research in Mathematics under Dr. Ganesh Prasad at Calcutta. The Government of the United Provinces have created two research studentships in Chemistry tenable at the two Agra colleges.

Dr. K. C. Mehta, Professor of Botany at the Agra College, continues his research on "Rusts of Wheat and Barley". The Imperial Council of Agricultural Research, which finances this work, has made a grant of Rs. 4,800 per annum for two years to the Agra College for additional staff in the Department of Botany to relieve Dr. Mehta of a part of his more routine teaching.

Arrangements have been made for the delivery of Inter-collegiate lectures. Of the 15 colleges affiliated to the University, everyone will have the benefit of a series of three lectures by a lecturer. The lecturers have been selected from the affiliated colleges and teaching Universities in the United Provinces.

It is a matter of gratification that the Governor acting with his Ministers, has been pleased to grant to the University the lease of a plot of land in the Hewett Park on a nominal rent of Re. 1 per annum. The foundation stone of the buildings of the University was laid by His Excellency Capt. Nawab Sir Muhammad Ahmad Said Khan, K.C.I.E., K.C.S.I., M.B.E., Governor of the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh and Chancellor of the Agra University on November 4, 1933. The plans of the building are well-nigh complete and it may be hoped that the building would be ready in about a year's time.

The Executive Council has amended regulations whereby in future the division in the Master's degree will be awarded on the marks of both the Previous and the Final examinations. No division will be awarded on the result of the Previous examination, but the candidate shall have to pass in the Previous examination before joining the Final course.

Also it has been decided that the B.Com. (Part I) Examination be abolished and that in future there should be only one examination at the end of two years' course for the B.Com. degree.

ALIGARH MUSLIM UNIVERSITY.

The year 1933 for the Muslim University has been one of considerable activity ; it has also been one which has called for much patience from all members of the University as the financial difficulties confronting the University compelled the imposition of a graded cut in the salaries of all employees in the University for a period of three years with effect from 1933.

The following changes have been made in the Statutes, Ordinances, and Regulations of the University :—

(b) *Clause 19B (1)* :-- The statutory obligation to hold the meetings of the Standing Finance Committee in September has been given up.

(c) *Clause 11 (1) (IX)* :-- The two members of the teaching staff lower in rank than a Professor, who, hitherto, held office for one year only, will now hold it for three years.

2. An amendment in the Ordinances suggesting that the medium of instruction and of examination of the High School Classes be Urdu has been passed by the Academic Council and is before the Government.

3. An amendment in Academic Council Regulation 7, Chapter XC, by which the medium of instruction in VI, VII and VIII Classes of the Schools has been changed to Urdu.

The Knighthood conferred on the Vice-Chancellor of the University was a source of great satisfaction to all members of the University, who felt that Sir Syed Ross Masood had well earned this distinction by the great efforts which he has made for the University and for its marked progress under his guidance.

During the year the Vice-Chancellor visited Afghanistan at the request of the Afghan Government to assist that Government with advice in the guidance of its educational policy. He returned to India shortly before the lamented death of the late King Nadir Shah.

Constructional work of an active nature was carried out during the year. The drainage scheme by which it is hoped to make the Irwin and Minto Circles completely free from being flooded during the rains, is now under the immediate supervision of Mr. Stonebridge, who hopes to complete the work before the commencement of next rains. This will materially improve the health and conditions of students in Aligarh during the rainy season and on the strength of the prospects afforded by the completion of this work, the Academic Council has recommended that the University session should commence in July 1934 instead of in October. It is hoped that this change will be permanent and that the University session will commence henceforth in July of each year. This will enable the Muslim University to open at the same time as nearly all Universities in India and will be a great convenience to many intending students.

The most noticeable feature of the Muslim University life during the year under review has been the opening of Aftab Hall which owes its origin to the generosity of Old Aligarh Men who have met the entire cost of building it. It was built to house 84 students, each in a single room of his own, and it was immediately filled. The objects of the Hall are firstly, to provide for Musulman students the advantages of a residential University at a much lower cost than has hitherto been possible; secondly, to maintain more vigorously the old Musulman traditions of simplicity of life, and to instil that principle into the minds of the coming generation; lastly, it is intended

to provide inexpensive and good facilities for the sons and relatives of Old Aligarh Men who may find themselves unable to meet the ordinary cost of residence for their sons in this University. This experiment has proved a great success and Morison Court, another 80 seats, have been added to Aftab Hall which needed extra accommodation, all of which have been occupied. The admissions to Aftab Hall this year were confined entirely to First and Second Division candidates. It is much to be hoped that the Halls in this residential University will not be standardized and that each Hall shall make its own appeal to the Community while preserving a proper regard for due economy, discipline and industry ; this will enable a system to be built up, of which the nucleus already exists resembling the Colleges of Oxford and Cambridge.

The reports of the various Departments show satisfactory work both in the Advanced and Research Classes and in the ordinary teaching classes during the year. There is a serious lack of satisfactory scholarships and bursaries, which, it is hoped, the generosity of the Muslim Public will eventually provide. These have already been provided in the Department of Theology, but they are necessary in every department if the best and most capable students are to be attracted.

The athletic achievements of the University during the year have been exceedingly good. In Cricket, Hockey, Tennis and Sports a long list of successes against formidable opponents is recorded and Mr. Mirza Fahim Beg won the individual Provincial Championship at the U.P. Olympic Athletic Meet. The University Training Corps has also done extremely well and more than held its own, winning some of the most valued cups open to the Battalion. During the year a Rifle Meeting was held which has proved very satisfactory.

The University during the year had the honour of receiving an address from His Excellency Rauf Bey, ex-Prime Minister of Turkey. His Excellency spent a few days as the guest of the Vice-Chancellor, and was received with affectionate respect and enthusiasm by the whole University. His address and his inspiring presence will long be remembered by all who had the privilege of meeting him. Among other distinguished visitors to the University was His Eminence the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, who addressed the students of the University on the proposed establishment of a Muslim University in Palestine and Dr. Shafaat Ahmad Khan, whose explanation of the work in London of the Indian delegates was very instructive.

ALLAHABAD UNIVERSITY.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN STAFF.

English Department.—Mr. Girjapati Mukerji, M.A., has been appointed an additional temporary Junior Lecturer up to the end of February 1934.

History Department.—Dr. Shafaat Ahmad Khan, M.A., Litt.D., who had proceeded to England to attend the Joint Select Committee, resumed his duties on the 6th December 1933. On his return Dr. R. P. Tripathi, M.A., D.Sc., ceased to act as Head of the Department.

Sanskrit Department.—Dr. P. K. Acharya, M.A., Ph.D., D.Litt., who had been granted leave out of India, resumed his duties on 18th November 1933. On his return from leave Dr. Babu Ram Saksena, M.A., D.Litt., reverted as Reader, Dr. Umesh Misra, M.A., D.Litt., as Lecturer and Shastri Raghubar Mitthu Lal, M.A., M.O.L., as Junior Lecturer.

Ordinances.—New ordinances relating to the admission of teachers to University examinations as private candidates have been passed. The ordinances relating to the re-checking of marks of unsuccessful candidates and the LL.M. examination have been revised.

Important Questions under Consideration.—The questions of the revision of the schemes for the B.A., M.A. and B.Sc. Honours degrees and of the prescription of a regular course of instruction in Music are still under consideration.

Buildings.—Government has sanctioned a non-recurring grant of Rs. 31,700 for the extension of the Physics Laboratory of the University.

Miscellaneous.—The Executive Council of the University has resolved that all whole-time salaried employees of the University excepting the Vice-Chancellor shall retire on completing the age of 60 years. The question of fixing an age limit in the case of the Vice-Chancellor is still under consideration.

The Court of the University has decided to place in the Senate Hall a life-size portrait of Mahamahopadhyaya Dr. Ganganatha Jha, M.A., D.Litt., LL.D., Vice-Chancellor of the University from 1923 to 1932, in commemoration of the distinguished services rendered by him to the University.

Mr. K. W. S. Jardine of the Ewing Christian College has offered an annual prize of books of the value of Rs. 50 to be known as Francis Jardine Prize for an original composition either in verse or prose to be competed for one year in English language, next year in Hindi and the third year in Urdu.

Mr. Panna Lal, I.C.S., Commissioner, Benares Division, has been elected a member of the Court from among the Registered Graduates in the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Hanuman Prasad Varma.

Mahamahopadhyaya Dr. Ganganatha Jha, M.A., D.Litt., LL.D., has been elected a member of the Executive Council from among the members of the Court elected by Registered Graduates in the vacancy caused by the appointment of Pt. Iqbal Narain Gurtu, M.A., LL.B., as Vice-Chancellor of the University.

Dr. S. B. Dutt, Reader in Chemistry, has been re-nominated as the representative of the University to serve on the Advisory Committee of the Harcourt Butler Technological Institute, Cawnpore, for a further period of 3 years.

The University has conferred the degree of Doctor of Laws *honoris causa* on Sir Malcolm Hailey, Chancellor of the University, on account of his eminent services to the cause of education.

ANDHRA UNIVERSITY.

BUILDINGS.

An important stage in the building programme of the University was reached when on the 8th December 1933, His Excellency the Chancellor opened the Jeypore Vikrama Deo College of Science and Technology and the University College of Arts. The former provides sufficient accommodation for the teaching of B.Sc. Hons. courses in Technology, Physics and Chemistry, while in the latter there is accommodation for the B.A. Hons. courses in History, Economics and Politics, Philosophy, Mathematics and Telugu. The Arts section of the Library is for the time being located in a big hall in the University College of Arts while the Science section is in the College of Science and Technology.

It will be remembered that the Rajah Sahib of Jeypore had announced his intention of contributing to the University an annual grant of Rupees One Lakh till such time as he or his heirs are able to endow the University with a capital sum of Rs. 15 Lakhs. The Rajah Sahib has since executed a bond thus giving a legal basis for the announcement. The sum is to be used mainly for the recurring expenditure of the University College of Science and Technology. It was in grateful recognition of this munificent gift that the University has named the College after the Donor as Jeypore Vikrama Deo College of Science and Technology.

The Hostels providing single room accommodation for about 140 students will be complete before the beginning of the next academic year. It is also expected that our Library building will be ready before the end of 1934, while we look forward to having our Convocation Hall, the absence of which has been seriously felt with the development of the University teaching activities, before the middle of 1935.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

It was announced in one of the previous issues of this Bulletin that Sir Alladi Krishnaswamy had offered to pay for the next ten years an annual contribution of Rs. 1,000 towards the institution of a Lecturership each year. The University has been particularly fortunate in having been able to secure the services of Poet Dr. Rabindranath Tagore, to deliver the first course of lectures. He delivered these on the 8th, 9th and 10th December 1933, the subject of the discourse being "Man". We had an attendance of about 3,000 each day.

HONOURS COURSES.

As stated in the last volume, first and second year courses in B.Sc. Hons. in Sugar Technology were opened in July last. The University now

provides for the study up to the Honours standard in History, Politics and Economics, Telugu Language and Literature, Mathematics, Philosophy, Physics, Chemistry and Technology with special reference to Sugar Industry.

VERNACULARIZATION.

The Report on Vernacularization deplored the lack of suitable text-books for the Intermediate classes. Steps are being taken to have such text-books prepared in all non-language subjects by competent scholars. It is expected that these will be ready by the end of 1935.

EXTENSION LECTURES.

As usual the Syndicate arranged for the delivery of a series of Extension lectures under the auspices of the University at different centres in the University area. MATTERS OF ACADEMIC IMPORTANCE.

The Academic Council adopted comprehensive Regulations for the award of M.A. and M.Sc. Degrees. The Regulations relating to the award of the Titles in Oriental Learning have been revised so that we have now one set of courses leading to Titles in Sanskrit Learning and another set leading to Titles in Vernacular Languages.

RESEARCH WORK.

A brief summary of the Research Work of the University Teachers :--

Sir J. C. Coyajee is working on such live subjects as *Indian Banking*, *The Economics of Fascism* and *The League of Nations and its Critics*. Mr. S. Purushottam of the Mathematics Department has written an important paper on "Schlicht" functions with "gaps". Mr. P. T. Raju of the Philosophy Department is working on *Hegel and Sankara*, from the side of Logic. Mr. M. V. N. Subba Rao, Lecturer in English, published a small book on *Shakespeare and the Problem of Evil*, which attracted much attention.

Mr. S. Bhagavantam, Reader in Physics, is engaged in investigating the special characters exhibited by the rotational Raman scattering in liquids as opposed to the case of gases, with a view to throw light on the important problem of the nature of the liquid state. Dr. I. Ramakrishna Rao of the Physics Department is continuing his work— the Nature of Solutions. He found out that while the oxy-acids dissociate progressively into their ions with addition of water, most of the other electrolytes including acids and salts are completely dissociated even at high concentrations. From his work on ice and water at different temperatures, it is clear that the number of triple, double and single molecules that exist in this substance could be computed. Dr. T. R. Seshadri of the Chemistry Department is engaged in important chemical investigations on plant products and has written a paper on flower pigmentation, which marks a definite advance on our present knowledge of that subject. Mr. G. Gopala Rao of the Chemistry Department has collected further evidence in support of the photo-chemical view of the nitrication process in soils. The important role of sunlight which his researches indicate will modify considerably our present views on the chemistry of soil processes. His results are in course of publication in the *Journal of Soil Science*. In collaboration with Mr. Pandalai, the Research Scholar, Mr. Gopala Rao has evolved a rapid and accurate method for the estimation of nitrites. The paper embodying the result has been accepted for publication in the London Journal, *The Analyst*.

Research and Publications. The second issue of the *University Journal*, a record of the research work done by the members of the teaching staff, was published in October, 1933.

Mukundamala, edited by Mr. K. Rama Pisharoti with Introduction and Appendices, and *Sabhapati Vilasa Nataka* by Mm. S. Dandapaniswami Dikshitar, were published as University Sanskrit Series Nos. 1 and 2.

The text-book on Logic in Tamil was published during the year.

Arrangements are being made to institute a prize of Rs. 1,000 with a view to the publication of a Tamil text-book on Chemistry on lines similar to those in respect of the publication of the text-book on Logic.

The Syndicate on the recommendation of the respective Boards of Studies have appointed eleven Research students to do research work in the various subjects under the guidance of the respective heads of departments.

A Special Committee has been appointed to report on the lines of research to be pursued by the Research Department in Tamil proposed to be established early next year. Necessary action will be taken after the report of the Special Committee is received.

Academic Questions under Consideration.—(i) The Syndicate on the recommendation of the Board of Studies in Mathematics accepted the proposal to increase the duration of each of the two question papers in Mathematics for the Intermediate Examination from two to three hours.

(ii) On the motion of the Academic Council and the Senate recommending the inclusion of Botany and Zoology as optional subjects for the B.Sc. pass course, the Syndicate has decided to arrange for starting instruction in Botany and Zoology under Part III of the B.Sc. Degree course with effect from the academic year 1934-35.

(iii) The courses of study for the B.A. (Hons.) Degree in Branches II and III (History and Economics) have been revised, and the modified schemes have been approved by the Syndicate. Suitable amendments to the Regulations giving effect to these proposals will be placed before the Academic Council at its meeting to be held in March, 1934.

(iv) The B.Sc. Degree examination will include, with effect from 1935, an additional practical test in Organic Chemistry. Necessary amendments to the Regulations have been approved by the Syndicate and will be placed before the Academic Council at its meeting to be held in March next.

General.—The recommendations of the *Ad Hoc* Committee appointed to examine the financial position of the University and to suggest retrenchment of expenditure wherever possible, were in the main accepted by the Syndicate, the Academic Council and the Senate. Suitable amendments to the Laws wherever necessary have been passed and will be given effect to at an early date.

The Syndicate has nominated M.R.Ry. Rao Bahadur S. F. Rungnadhan Avl., M.A., I.E.S., Vice-Chancellor, Mr. S. Satyamurti, B.A., B.L., and Dr. B. V. Narayanaswami Naidu, M.A., Ph.D., B.Com., Bar-at-Law, as delegates to the Quinquennial Conference of the Universities to be held at Delhi in March next.

The British Universities Debating Team, during its tour in India, paid a visit to this University on the 16th October 1933 and participated in a debate which was arranged under the auspices of the University Union on 'Mankind has more to fear than to hope from Science'.

Convocation.—The Third Convocation for conferring diplomas and titles was held on Thursday, the 26th October 1933, when His Excellency the Chancellor, the Right Hon'ble Lieutenant-Colonel Sir George Frederick Stanley, P.C., G.C.I.E., C.M.G., presided. BENARES HINDU UNIVERSITY.

1. Enrolment of Students.

On the 31st March 1933, the total number of students on the rolls was 3,305. In the current academic session which commenced in July 1933 there was a great rush for admission, and the total number has consequently increased to 3,462. Out of 3,462 students on the rolls, 1,985 students are living in the eight Hostels provided for the purpose. It is gratifying to note that there are 103 women students in the University.

II. Changes in the Staff.

The period under report has been marked with several notable changes in the staff of the University. Dr. G. S. K. Iyer, M.B., D.P.H. (Edinburgh), I.M.S. (Late), Zygonist and Golden Key (Vienna), has been appointed Specialist in Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat diseases for the Sir Sunderlal Hospital which is an adjunct to the College of Ayurveda. Dr. Ram Chandra, M.B.B.S., I.M.S. (Late), retired Civil Surgeon, has been appointed Honorary Chief Medical Officer of the University. Another notable accession to the staff is the appointment of Dr. Gargi Devi Mathur, Ph.D. (London), as Lecturer of English in the Women's College.

In addition to the above the teaching staff has been further strengthened by a dozen new appointments in the grades of Assistant Professors, Tutors, and Demonstrators.

III. Changes in the Statutes and Regulations.

Some notable changes have been introduced in the Statutes and Regulations of the University. The following are some of the important alterations.—

- (1) In pursuance of Section 16 (A) of the Benares Hindu University Act, as amended, the Council of the University recommended a set of Statutes for the proper administration of Provident Fund. The Court at its meeting held on the 18th of December 1932, accepted the recommendations which have been duly incorporated in the Statutes. As a result of this change the administration of Provident Fund Accounts has been placed on a sound footing and it is hoped that it will be possible to secure exemption from the payment of income-tax under the Provident Fund Act of 1925.
- (2) Another noteworthy change has been introduced in the Statutes of the University. Under Statute 19 (1), Class II (*d*), members of the Teaching Staff, with the exception of the University Professors, could send only ten representatives to the Senate. In view of the growing number of teachers in the University the representation hitherto enjoyed was considered inadequate. The Statute has, therefore, been amended, and members of the teaching staff will now have fifteen seats on the Senate.
- (3) A new chapter in the Regulations (Chapter XIX A) has been added with a view to provide for the withdrawal and cancellation of Degrees under certain conditions.
- (4) The Regulations relating to Private Candidates for the Admission Examination (Chapters XIV and XL) have been amended with a view to provide additional facilities, specially for women candidates.

IV. The Convocation.

The Sixteenth Convocation of the University for conferring degrees was held on December 11, 1933. In appreciation of their valuable services to the cause of education in general, and to the Benares Hindu University in particular, the degree of Doctor of Laws *honoris causa* was conferred on Sir P. S. Sivaswamy Iyer and the Degrees of Doctor of Science on Sir Jagadish Chandra Bose and Sir P. C. Ray.

Mr. Pitamber Dutt Barthwal, M.A., Lecturer in Hindi, was admitted to the D.Litt. Degree as a result of his thesis on the *Nirguna School of Hindi Poetry* having been approved by Dr. Grahame Bailey of the London School of Oriental Studies, Professor R. D. Ranade, M.A., Head of the Department of Philosophy, Allahabad University, and Rai Bahadur Professor Syam Sundar Das, Head of the Department of Hindi, Benares Hindu University.

BOMBAY UNIVERSITY.

CHANGES IN PERSONNEL.

With the frequent elections that are in progress, the personnel of the University is always in a flux. The changes during the period worth notice are the elections of the new Deans in the Faculties of Arts, Science and Medicine. As the result of the annual election in the month of August last, Prof. V. K. Joag, Professor K. R. Kanitkar and Dr. N. A. Purandare have become the Deans for the current year of the Faculties of Arts, Science and Medicine, respectively.

VISITORS.

A distinguished scholar who visited this University recently was Pandit Jina Vijaya Muniji of Shantiniketan. He was invited by this University to deliver the Thakkar Vassonji Madhavji Lectures for the current year and the course of lectures attracted a large audience.

The visit of the members of the British Universities Debating Team aroused lively interest in the student world and for the three days they were here, they were pretty busy, notwithstanding the fact that in the official programme arranged for them by the University, the mornings on each of these days were left free. The debate which was held in the Empire Theatre was largely attended and provided a very interesting afternoon. The presence of this team in our midst clearly pointed to one defect in the University organization and that was the absence of a University Students' Union. The want of such an organization made the work of bringing the visitors in touch with real representatives of students very difficult.

ACADEMIC QUESTIONS.

During the period under review, a substantial advance was recorded in the matter of the establishment of the University Department of Chemical Technology. The Local Government consented to lease to the University the East Wing of the Royal Institute of Science on certain conditions and the ceremony of actual handing over of the Wing took place on the 15th November last. The newly appointed Head of the Department, Dr. R. B. Forster arrived in this country in the last week of October and he is now busy preparing plans and detailed estimates regarding the structural alterations, the mechanical equipment and other furniture and fixtures of the Department. It is proposed to commence the actual working of the Department from June 1934.

Among other important questions the question of the change of the annual examination season from March-April to November-December has been raised and is receiving attention. A committee has been appointed to

go into it and report thereon to the Syndicate. The report of the Committee is awaited.

GENERAL.

The University Act of 1928 aimed at widening the basis of elections to the Senate and a variety of interests were given representation. A step in further democratization of that body has now been taken by the Senate and graduates of three years' standing are enfranchised. Formerly, graduates of ten years' standing and Masters had a right to send their representatives to the Senate and the new proposal will considerably widen the electorate of the Registered Graduates Constituency.

CALCUTTA UNIVERSITY.

I. An Educational Conference was held at the Government House during the closing week of November. The University of Calcutta was represented at the Conference by the Vice-Chancellor, Dr. U. N. Brahmachari, Dr. Bidhanchandra Roy, Mr. C. C. Biswas, Mr. Pramathanath Banerjee and Mr. Syamaprasad Mookerjee. The Conference discussed some of the pressing educational problems of the day. The Government appear to be particularly anxious to re-organize the existing system of Secondary Education and the official representatives are in favour of reducing the number of Secondary Schools in Bengal. The Conference came to the conclusion that a careful survey should be made with a view to explore the causes of the weakness of the present system and to prescribe remedies. The University has long been pressing the necessity of revising the present Matriculation syllabus and of introducing the mother tongue of the candidate as medium of teaching and examination. This proposal is still awaiting Government sanction. It was also decided to refer the following questions to a Committee of eight members consisting of six representatives of the two Universities and two nominees of the Government:—

- (1) Length of Honours Course.
- (2) Possibility of restriction of courses of study at the two Universities more particularly in the Post-Graduate Departments to avoid duplication of work and waste of resources.
- (3) Combination of Law studies with other Post-Graduate studies.
- (4) Comparative failure in recent years of Bengali students in All-India Service Examinations.

We ardently hope that the new scheme of Matriculation Examination will receive prompt attention from the University and the Committee will set to work at an early date.

II. Our grateful thanks are due to Dr. Harendracoomar Mookerjee, University Inspector of Colleges who has recently created an endowment of Rs. 1,00,000 to award scholarships to deserving Bengalee Protestant Christians for training in Applied Commerce, both in India and abroad. It may be noted that this is the second donation that the University has received from Dr. Mookerjee. The munificent donor belongs to the Bengalee middle class and has ungrudgingly given away his life's saving for the benefit of his community. Will the grandees of Bengal fail to emulate the noble example of a poor teacher?

III. We extend our hearty welcome to the Vice-Chancellor and the Minto Professor of Economics who recently returned from their tour in Europe. The Vice-Chancellor has earned fresh laurels in England, but his

homecoming was overcast with a deep gloom as Lady Suhrawardy passed away during his absence from home. It may be some comfort in his bereavement to learn that thousands in this country condole with him and share his great sorrow.

IV. Professor Sahid Suhrawardy joined his duties after the Puja Vacation. After his appointment to the Bagiswari Chair of Fine Arts he proceeded to Europe for further study and research. He devoted his time most usefully in examining the best specimens of Oriental Art available at the greatest museums of Europe, and we have no doubt that he will maintain the tradition created by the first incumbent of this Chair Dr. Abanindranath Tagore.

V. We congratulate Mr. Ramaprasad Mookerjee on his appointment to the Tagore Professorship of Law. This is one of the highest honours in the gift of the University and we note with pleasure that the same honour was conferred on the new Professor's father Sir Asutosh Mookerjee. Among his predecessors were such illustrious jurists as Sir Rashbehary Ghosh and Julius Jolly. We have no doubt that Mr. Mookerjee's lectures will prove as valuable as those of his famous father.

VI. Dr. R. P. Paranjpye has been appointed Kamala Lecturer for the year 1933 and it is quite in the fitness of things that the first Vice-Chancellor of the Indian Women's University should be appointed to the Lectureship founded by an affectionate father to perpetuate the memory of a loving daughter. The subject of Dr. Paranjpye's discourse is "Rationalism in Practice".

VII. Mr. Kumudbandhu Sen is one of the few exponents of the dramatic genius of Girischandra Ghosh. We are glad to announce that he has been appointed Girischandra Ghosh Lecturer in succession to Mr. Hemendra Nath Dasgupta to discourse on "Girischandra—His Mind and Art".

VIII. One of the foremost scientists of India has been appointed Adharchandra Mukherjee Lecturer for 1933. We note with pleasure and pride that Dr. Meghnad Saha, the new lecturer, is a genuine product of this University and began his teaching career as a Lecturer in the Post-Graduate Department of Science. He was appointed to the Ghosh Chair of Physics before he obtained a more lucrative Professorship at Allahabad. He will lecture on "The Ultimate Constituents of Matter".

IX. Mr. G. Montagu Harris has been appointed a special University Reader to deliver a course of lectures on "Comparative Study of Local Self-Government and Regional Planning". Mr. Kshitishchandra Chatterjee, Lecturer in Comparative Philology, has been appointed an Honorary Reader. Well versed in our ancient Sanskrit lores, Mr. Chatterjee proposes

to expound some of the most abstruse and complicated problems of Sanskrit Grammar.

X. The Jagattarini Gold Medal goes this year to Mr. Kedarnath Banerjee. It is an honour coveted by every Bengalee literary man and among its recipients are Rabindranath Tagore and Saratchandra Chatterjee. Mr. Kedarnath Banerjee holds a unique place in Bengali literature and the choice of the University will meet with universal approval.

XI. Among our latest publications, Dr. S. C. Bagchi's *Juristic Personality of Hindu Deities* and Mr. Narendrakrishna Sinha's *Monograph on Ranjit Singh* deserve special mention. Dr. Bagchi is a well-known authority on the subject and his treatment of the subject is quite in keeping with his reputation. Mr. Sinha is still young but his work shows great promise. He was one of the few Bengali students who selected Sikh History as the special subject of their study and Mr. Sinha's performance fully justifies the late Sir Asutosh's decision to provide for teaching in all branches of Indian History at Calcutta.

XII. Mr. Jogeschandra Chakravorti, M.A., Registrar, returned from leave on the 14th August, 1933.

XIII. Rai Bahadur Narendranath Sen, M.A., B.Sc., Controller of Examinations, having been granted leave, Dr. Binodebehari Dutt, M.A., B.L., Ph.D., Assistant Controller of Examinations, has been appointed to officiate as Controller of Examinations of the University in addition to his own duties.

XIV. Mr. Sailendranath Basu, B.A., Audit Officer, having been granted leave, Mr. Nareschandra Chakrabarti, M.A., A.S.A.A. (Lond.), L.A., Incorporated Accountant, has been appointed to carry on the duties of the Audit Officer.

XV. Mr. R. O. Raha, M.A., B.L., Barrister-at-Law, has been appointed University Inspector of Hostels and Messes.

XVI. Scottish Universities Mission College, Kalimpong, was granted affiliation up to the I.A. standard with effect from the commencement of the session 1933-34 in the following subjects :—

CHANGE IN THE ORDINANCES.

The most important change in the Ordinances and Regulations during this term is the abolition of all restrictions about combination of subjects for the B.A. Pass degree, provided that no two Oriental subjects are offered together. A revised edition of the Ordinances and Regulations has been printed incorporating the new changes made up to the end of last session.

The time limit for the ordinary degree of Bachelor of Science has been abolished in the University.

At the invitation of the University a British University Debating Team consisting of three young graduates organized by the National Union of students of the Universities and University Colleges of England and Wales, visited the University of Dacca and a debate was held in the Curzon Hall on the 28th October 1933. The subject of the debate was "That the world owes more to Poets than to Politicians". Two representatives of the British Team with one Dacca representative spoke for the motion and one representative of the British Team with two Dacca representatives spoke against the motion. The visit was welcome to the students and staff of the University. The young Britishers and our students were mutually eager to know and appreciate the hopes, ideals and aspirations of one another. The British Team created a favourable impression by their debate.

DELHI UNIVERSITY.

New University Buildings.—The question of the permanent location of the University and its colleges in the old Viceregal Lodge Estate was finally decided by the Government of India last September. The Central portion of the Estate containing the main building of the Viceregal Lodge, the Prince's Pavilion and other buildings, covering an area of about 71 acres, and another area of about 16 acres were handed over to the University in October last. The University offices and the library have been accommodated in the main building. Residential accommodation also has been provided for the Registrar and the Librarian in the Central Area. The question of providing residential accommodation for the University teachers and others will be considered later.

The second area of about 16 acres is intended eventually for the location of the University Law Hall and Hostel and the residence of the Warden and Law lecturers. But the Law Hall and Hostel continue at present to be located in certain buildings on the southern side of the old Viceregal Lodge, and they will be removed to their permanent site after adequate additions and alterations to the buildings on that area have been carried out.

The University Physics and Chemistry laboratories have not yet been removed to the new buildings, as their transfer during term time from their present location was likely to dislocate the teaching work. Further the two buildings in the Central area which are available for the laboratories, will require considerable additions and alterations before they could be made suitable for the purpose of the laboratories.

Sites for buildings for the various constituent colleges, as also for playgrounds and recreation for the University and the colleges, have also been reserved in the Estate.

Personnel of Officers.—The Hon'ble Mian Sir Fazl-i-Hussain, K.C.S.I., K.C.I.E., Kt., Education Member of the Viceroy's Executive Council, has been reappointed Pro-Chancellor by His Excellency the Chancellor for a further term of three years.

Professor H. L. Chablani, M.A., was re-elected Dean of the Faculty of Arts for a further period of three years from November 1933.

Sir Kikabhai Premchand Readership Lectures in Economics for 1934.—Mr. K. T. Shah, B.A., B.Sc. (Hons.), Barrister-at-Law of Bombay, has been invited to deliver the Sir Kikabhai Premchand Readership Lectures for 1934. The subject of his lectures will be "The Economic Consequences of Price Changes since the War", and the lectures will be delivered early in March next.

University Training Corps.—The strength of the Corps on 30th September 1933 was 5 officers, 6 under-officers and 325 other ranks. The annual camp commenced on 29th September. Five officers, 4 under-officers and 210 other ranks reported in camp. This attendance is considered very satisfactory and indeed constitutes a Battalion record. The camp period was very successful. All ranks showed the greatest keenness and did their best to benefit by the 15 days' training. The Battalion was inspected by Brigadier A. L. M. Molesworth, Commanding Delhi Independent Brigade Area, on the 14th October. He was very pleased with the training carried out and the fine camp attendance.

The Adjutant reports that the spirit of the unit is remarkably good.

The above lectures arranged by the Extra-mural Instruction Committee are intended for the benefit of persons of fair education, who can understand English, but whom circumstances have prevented from benefiting by a regular University instruction. The lectures delivered come under the following groups: (1) General Science; (2) Social Science; (3) Medical Science; and (4) Civics, Politics and Literature. In addition, two other types of extra-mural lectures, which will be of a more elementary and popular character will be delivered. These lectures will be in the vernacular and arranged for the city working men. Besides the above, a third group of lectures will be delivered for the benefit of cultivators in some villages adjacent to Lucknow, and the subjects treated will be of intimate interest to life and welfare of the peasantry.

Changes in Personnel. - During the period under report, there has been a change in the *personnel* of the Deans of Faculties of the Arts and Science. Prof. N. K. Sidhanta has been elected Dean of the Faculty of Arts, in place of Prof. S. B. Smith, and Dr. Birbal Sahnî has been elected Dean of the Faculty of Science in place of Dr. Wali Mohammad. Dr. H. L. Dey, who was Lecturer in Economics from the foundation of the University, has

left for Dacca having been appointed Reader in Economics in the Dacca University. His place has been taken up by Mr. Sitla Prasad Saksena, M.A. (Lucknow).

Mr. S. N. Mathur, M.B.B.S. (Lucknow), M.S., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., F.R.C.S., has been appointed Reader in Surgery in place of Dr. K. S. Nigam, formerly Reader in Surgery, who was appointed to the post of Professor of Surgery.

A new post of Lecturer in Political Science has been created and Dr. B. M. Sharma, a Ph.D. of this University, has been appointed to the post.

Another new post of Demonstrator in Chemistry has been created, and Dr. S. N. Shukla, M.Sc., Ph.D., another *alumnus* of the University, has been appointed to the post.

Dr. P. C. Kacker, Lecturer in Surgery, has reverted to Government service, and Dr. Triveni Prasad, M.B.B.S. (Lucknow), F.R.C.S., D.L.O., has been appointed Lecturer.

Mr. Dhurjati Prasad Mukerji, Lecturer in Economics, has been on leave during the period of the report, and Mr. Anadi Nath Banerji, M.A. (Lucknow), has been appointed to officiate as Lecturer.

Lt.-Col. H. C. Buckley has ceased to be part-time Professor of Obstetrics and Gynæcology, consequent on his appointment as Inspector-General of Civil Hospitals, and Lt.-Col. C. H. Reinhold, Civil Surgeon of Lucknow, has been appointed Professor.

Mr. Om Prasad Gupta, Lecturer in Economics in the Faculty of Commerce, has gone on leave from the 9th October 1933 till the end of the session, and in his place, Mr. Trilok Narain, B.Com., M.A. (Lucknow), and Mr. A. L. Loombax, M.A. (Lucknow), have been appointed.

Mr. D. N. Majumdar, Lecturer in Economics, has gone on study leave from the beginning of the current session, and in his place Mr. Hari Dev, M.A. (Lucknow), has been appointed.

Pandit Badri Nath Bhatt, Lecturer in Hindi, has been granted leave for the current session, and Mr. Din Dayal Gupta, M.A., has been appointed to officiate as Lecturer.

A new post of Lecturer in German has been created, and Dr. (Miss) D. Speer has been appointed Lecturer.

Dr. A. C. Chatterji, Lecturer in Chemistry, who was on study leave, rejoined duty in the beginning of the current session.

Mr. Sasadhar Banerji, Lecturer in Mathematics, who was on leave from the 14th December 1932, returned to duty from the beginning of the current session.

Dr. Lakshmi Narayan, Reader in Mathematics, has been on leave from the 9th October 1933, and in his place Mr. Raj Chandra Srivastava, M.Sc. (Lucknow), has been appointed as temporary Lecturer.

Rai Bahadur Captain J. G. Mukerji, who was on leave, during the latter part of the last session, returned to duty in the beginning of the current session.

Mr. R. R. Khanna, Registrar, was on leave for two months, and during his absence Mr. Inayat Ullah Butt, Assistant Registrar, was appointed to officiate as Registrar, the Assistant Registrarship having been filled up by the appointment of Mr. V. T. Gopalakrishniah, Personal Assistant to the Vice-Chancellor.

Government have sanctioned the special appointment of Mr. K. N. Kaul as research assistant to Dr. B. Sahni to help him in his well-known researches in Fossil Botany. The appointment is for the present till the end of this financial year but it is expected to be continued in future.

Matters of General Interest.—The twelfth annual Convocation of the University was held on the 9th December, 1933. His Excellency the Chancellor presided. The Convocation Address was delivered by Sir P. S. Sivaswami Aiyer, K.C.S.I., C.I.E., LL.D., and it was listened to with rapt attention.

The University Training Corps held its annual training camp in Lucknow between the 1st and the 15th November 1933 and the 'B' company of this University participated in it.

The University considered the question of instituting a Diploma in Dental Surgery. A scheme was prepared by the Faculty of Medicine, and has met with the general approval of the Academic and the Executive Councils. It was submitted to Government for the provision of funds. It was proposed to have (i) a two years' course for medical graduates, and (ii) a four years' course for under-graduate medical students. Government have, however, expressed their inability to finance the scheme in the near future.

A need has for some time been felt for a Women's Hostel under the University. The matter has been taken into consideration, and Government has been approached to provide the non-recurring and recurring expenditure and also some other necessary facilities in order to initiate the proposal.

Up till now, the University has been granting freeships in the Faculty of Law to the extent of 3 per cent of the enrolment in the Faculty. But it was felt that this was not quite adequate, particularly as in other Faculties the percentage is 5 per cent. The Executive Council has now decided that freeships in the Faculty of Law should also be 5 per cent of the enrolment.

As a measure of economy, the University recently had to retrench the allotment for "Educational Tours to students". But it was realized that this was not a cut in the right direction. The Executive Council have, therefore, restored a grant of Rs. 1,000 for this purpose during the current year.

The annual recurring grant for the Library has all along been considered inadequate, and recently it was noticed that several departments of teaching had actually to be starved for want of books and periodicals. The Executive Council have therefore increased the allotment by Rs. 6,000 thus bringing the total allotment for books and journals to Rs. 17,000.

The University received a communication from the Government suggesting that the University might consider the possibility of curtailing the University vacations and holidays. This question was carefully examined by the Academic and the Executive Councils in all its bearings, and Government has been informed that no curtailment, either in the vacations or in the holidays, is possible.

The Vice-Chancellor and the Deans of the Faculties of Arts and Science have been appointed as delegates to the Quinquennial Universities Conference to be held at Delhi on the 6th, 7th and 8th March, 1934.

The Vice-Chancellor represented the University at the Jubilee celebrations of the Punjab University, held on the 4th, 5th and 6th December, 1933.

Rai Bahadur Dr. B. N. Vyas, Reader in Pharmacology, has been elected as representative of the University on the Indian Medical Council, which has been constituted under the recent Indian Medical Council Act.

The British Universities Debating Team, consisting of three representatives from British Universities, visited this University between the 6th and the 8th November, 1933. On the 7th November, a debate was held under the auspices of the University Union, in which three students of this University also took part. The subject of the debate was "Humanity has much to lose, and less to hope for from Science". After a keen and interesting debate, the motion was put to the vote and declared lost.

Financial Position. The financial position of the University is seriously agitating the responsible authorities. The following is a brief summary from the proceedings of the Finance Committee of the University.

The Registrar explained that from the budget estimates of 1933-34 it was apparent that the normal recurring income of the University, including the Government grant (as available in 1932-33) was Rs. 12,72,000 and the normal recurring expenditure was Rs. 14,02,000. After deducting a sum of Rs. 21,000 from the above for possible under-estimation of income and possible over-budgetting in some places, it still left the University with a shortage of Rs. 1,09,000 annually. Intimation had been received that Government had restored a sum of Rs. 31,000 out of the emergency cut of Rs. 62,000. Further, the income from tuition fees had increased this year by Rs. 13,000 owing to increased enrolment. Taking both these sources also into account, the University was still left with a recurring deficit of Rs. 65,000 annually.

"It was therefore estimated that unless the block grant sanctioned by Government for the period 1925-30 was revised, the University will be running short by Rs. 65,000 per annum. It was explained that a substantial part of this deficit was due to the natural increments in salaries of staff between 1927 (the level year of the last block grant) and the year 1933."

The prospect is gloomy, and unless Government comes to the rescue of the University, its activities will have to be curtailed and its usefulness will be very much impaired.

MADRAS UNIVERSITY.

REGULATIONS, COURSES OF STUDIES AND EXAMINATIONS.

The B.Sc. Honours Degree Examination Regulations were revised. Minor alterations in the Regulations governing the several examinations were also made. The Revision of the Regulations governing all the examinations with a view to ensure uniformity in arrangement, is under consideration.

It has been resolved to institute a Degree in Veterinary Science in the University.

The question of the recognition of the examinations of other Universities has been a subject of discussion. The Syndicate after considering all correspondence on the matter has resolved that :

1. The Entrance Examination of any Indian University be accepted as equivalent to the Matriculation Examination of the Madras University ; and
2. Except in the case of admission to Professional courses of study (where the Syndicate may dispense with a strict compliance with the conditions) applicants from other Universities must have obtained a first or second class or 45 per cent of the total marks in their examinations for admission to courses of study in this University.

CONVOCATIONS.

There were two Convocations held during the half-year. The first Convocation held on the 3rd August 1933 had two sessions, one in the morning mainly for the graduates who took a second Degree and the other in the evening for the persons who took their first Degrees, and Doctorate Degrees and all other Degree-holders who were recipients of prizes and medals. The other Convocation was held on the 7th December 1933. His Excellency the Chancellor presided over the afternoon session of the first Convocation held on the 3rd August 1933 and the Vice-Chancellor presided over the other two Convocations.

The Rev. P. Carty, S.J., B.Sc., D.D., delivered the address to the Graduates of the year at the Convocation held in the afternoon of the 3rd August. There were no addresses read at the other Convocations.

The total number of persons that took the several Degrees, Diplomas and Certificates at the Convocations was 2,448.

COURSES OF STUDIES, ETC.

A Pre-Medical Course of six months' duration comprising the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Medicine, Botany and Zoology has been instituted preliminary to admission to the Medical College. The minimum qualification for admission to the course is a pass in the I.Sc. Examination with an optional group comprising at least two of the above subjects. The course will start in July 1934.

The Faculty of Engineering has proposed that provision should be made for passed B.E. candidates of the Mechanical or Electrical Engineering branch taking a supplementary course in Electrical or Mechanical Engineering respectively before taking the B.E. Degree. This supersedes a previous proposal to combine the Mechanical and the Electrical branches.

The course of study for the B.T. Degree has been revised so that Educational Psychology and Mental and Educational Measurements may be included in one paper.

The Scheme for the Final Examination for the Honours Degree in Arts has been revised so as to comprise a single group of a major subject of study instead of a major and a subsidiary group.

Economics has been instituted as an optional subject in the Intermediate Course from July 1933.

IMPORTANT EDUCATIONAL QUESTIONS.

With the codification of the Laws of the University into Statutes, Ordinances, Rules of Business, etc., now before the Senate, the new Regulation will come into complete working order.

The proposal to open a separate department of Hygiene has been kept in abeyance.

The question of improving qualification for admission to the Intermediate Courses is under correspondence with the Board for the award of S.S.L.C. which at present secures admission to the University.

At its meeting held on 1st December, 1933, the University Court passed a resolution recommending to the Executive Council the suspension of the Extension Lectures until a scheme for broadcasting the lectures had been adopted by the University.

2. PROPOSALS UNDER THE CONSIDERATION OF THE UNIVERSITY.

(1) The University has exempted all candidates for examinations belonging to the Depressed and Aboriginal Classes, from payment of examination fees during the period 1934-40.

(2) German has now been added as an optional subject for the Intermediate and B.A. Examinations.

(3) The Executive Council has appointed a Committee to consider the methods of providing physical instruction for the students of Colleges connected with the University.

(4) The Academic Council has appointed a Committee to consider how far it is practicable for the University to provide instruction for examinations in an Oriental Faculty.

(5) The Faculty of Law has recommended to the Academic Council that the LL.M. Examination should be split into two parts, *viz.*, the Previous and the Final, as in the case of the LL.B. Examination.

3. COLLEGES.

(1) The University has decided, subject to the sanction of the Local Government, to affiliate the Hitkarini Sabha City College, Jubbulpore, up to B.A. Standard ; and the Hitkarini Sabha Law College, Jubbulpore, up to LL.B. Standard (in Law only).

5. *Convocation*.—The Annual Convocation of the University was held on the 25th November 1933. His Excellency Sir James David Sifton, K.C.S.I., K.C.I.E., I.C.S., Chancellor of the University, presided. The Convocation was addressed by Dr. R. P. Paranjpye, M.A., B.Sc., D.Sc., Vice-Chancellor of the University of Lucknow.

The degree of Doctor of Law *honoris causa* was conferred upon the Hon'ble Sir Ganesh Dutta Singh, Minister of Local Self-Government at the Convocation, on the ground that he was by reason of his eminent position and attainments a fit and proper person to receive such a degree.

6. *Miscellaneous*.—There is a Training Corps of the University known as the 7th (Patna) Company University Training Corps of the Indian Territorial Force and 98 students from different colleges at Patna are enrolled, consisting of a Company Sergeant Major, a Company Quarter Master, five Sergeants, six Corporals, nine Lance-Corporals and 76 Cadets. There is also a waiting list of 86 students who have applied for enrolment. The Corps receives Rs. 2,400 from Government as training grant for the annual training camp. A special Government grant of Rs. 6,140-15-0 for various items of expenditure was made during the year. The University, besides paying the Bungalow rent and taxes, makes an annual grant of Rs. 1,500.

The British Debating Team visited this University on the 2nd of November. The debate in which some of our students took part was highly appreciated by a packed audience of students.
