ENDOWMENTS.**Raja of Jeypore Endowment**

Sri Raja Vikrama Deo Varma, Raja of Jeypore, has executed a bond agreeing to pay towards the recurring expenditure of the University College of Science and Technology (called after him as the Jeypore Vikrama Deo College of Science and Technology in grateful recognition of his munificent gift) an annual contribution of Rs. 50,000 in 1933—1934, of Rs. 75,000 in 1934—1935, and of Rs. 1,00,000 thereafter, till such time when he or his heirs might pay up a capital sum of Rs. 15,00,000.

Maharajah of Bobbili Endowment

Maharajah Sri Rao Sir Venkataswetachelapati Ranga Rao Bahadur of Bobbili, G.C.B.E., the First Pro-Chancellor of the Andhra University made a donation of one lakh of Rupees to the University for the encouragement of Telugu and Sanskrit learning. The Senate at its meeting held on 30th August 1926 accepted the donation.

The Senate has since resolved that two-thirds of the income from the endowment be utilized for the encouragement of Telugu and one-third for the encouragement of Sanskrit. The amount of income allotted to Telugu will be utilized in the first instance for the compilation of a History of the Telugu Language and Literature and the amount allotted to Sanskrit was utilised, as a temporary measure for four years, for the institution of two scholarships each of the monthly value of Rs. 50 and awarded to competent scholars for research in Sanskrit; and from the year 1932-33 onwards, it was resolved to utilize the funds for the publication of rare books of literary value.

Raja of Panagal Endowment

The Rajah of Panagal, M.L.C., announced at the time of the inauguration of the Senate on 30th August 1926, through His Excellency the Chancellor, his intention to endow in due course the University with landed property of the annual value of Rs. 5,000 for the purpose of the institution of a Readership in Experimental Psychology and undertook that he would pay till the endowment was made a sum of Rs. 5,000 per annum to the University from the time the work was begun. The landed endowment has not yet been made. As a temporary measure the Senate on the recommendation of the Syndicate, instituted a fellowship in Experimental Psychology of the annual value of Rs. 2,500 and awarded it during 1928-31 to Mr. T. A. Purushottam, M. A.

Sir Alladi Krishnaswami Aiyar Endowment

Sir Alladi Krishnaswamy Aiyar, Advocate-General, Madras, offered an annual donation of Rs. 1,000 to the University for the purpose of instituting lectures by distinguished Scholars. The Senate, at its meeting held on 6—12—1932, accepted the offer under the following terms and conditions:—

- (1) The donation shall continue in the first instance for a period of ten years, and is conditioned on the donor being alive during the period.
- (2) The first payment shall be made in April 1932 and shall be treated as the contribution for 1931—32. So long as Prof. Sir S. Radhakrishnan is the Vice-Chancellor, it shall be in his absolute discretion to devote the said sum for any Lectureship by any distinguished scholars he thinks fit, provided that the decision of Prof. Sir S. Radhakrishnan shall be subject to the confirmation by the Syndicate.
- (3) If Prof. Sir S. Radhakrishnan ceases to be the Vice-Chancellor during the currency of the period of ten years referred to, the Donor shall have the right to prescribe the purposes for which and the conditions subject to which the donation shall be utilised.

Kistna District Board Fellowships (2)

These Fellowships are* two in number, each of the value of Rs. 100 per month tenable in India for a period of one year. The Syndicate has power to extend these fellowships for a period not exceeding two years if necessary. The amount is to be met from the interest derived from the donation of Rs. 50,000 made by the Kistna District Board. The Fellowships are awarded for research in departments of Science.

They shall be awarded for a period of two years in the first instance for research in Humanities to Honours Graduates or Masters of Arts of outstanding merit who have got an aptitude for research. The Syndicate shall have power to extend in any particular case the Scholarship by another year. The cost of the Scholarships shall be met from the interest derived from the donation of Rs. 40,000 made by the Guntur District Board.

The Goschen Scholarships (2)

The Goschen Memorial Fund Committee offered an Endowment of a sum of Rs. 8,700 to be invested in Government Securities for the purpose of founding two Scholarships in perpetuation of the Memory of Lord Goschen, who was Governor of Madras from 1924—1929. The Senate, at its meeting held on 6th March 1931 accepted the endowment and approved the following conditions for award of the Scholarships:—

1. The scholarships shall be called "The Goschen Scholarships".
2. The scholarships shall be two in number, each of the annual value of Rs. 108.
3. The scholarships shall be awarded to poor deserving candidates who among the successful candidates in the Intermediate Examination of the Andhra University held in March—April each year:
 - (a) pass in all parts of the examination at one and the same time.
 - (b) continue their studies for the B.A. Degree Examination in Group (iv)—History and Economics (Economics Main) in the University College or in an affiliated College.
4. The scholarships shall ordinarily be tenable for two years, but shall not be held in conjunction with any other Scholarship or Scholarships excepting such fee concession as may be granted under the Madras Educational Rules.
5. The amount of each Scholarship shall be disbursed in three instalments each year at the beginning of each term through the Principal of the College concerned.
6. The Syndicate shall have power to declare that the holder of the Scholarship has forfeited it for want of satisfactory progress in his studies or for any misconduct which it may consider as sufficient cause for such forfeiture, and there shall be no appeal from the decision of the Syndicate.

7. All unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.

8. The Senate shall have power consistently with the spirit of the endowment to make such changes in the conditions of award as new circumstances may render necessary.

1. Sreemathi Vangala Vanalata Devi Memorial Prize

Dr. V. S. Ram, M.A., Ph.D. (Harvard), F.R. His. S., Lucknow, endowed a sum of Rs. 1,200 for instituting a prize in memory of his wife, Srimathi Vangala Vanalathadevi, and the Senate at its meeting held on 2nd October 1931 accepted the endowment and approved the following conditions of award of the Prize:—

1. The prize shall be called "Sreemathi Vangala Vanalata Devi Memorial Prize".
2. The prize shall be in the shape of books of the value of about Rs. 50.
3. (a) The prize shall be awarded annually at the Convocation to the Woman candidate who, in passing at the first appearance the B.A. (Hons.) Degree Examination in History (Politics) held in the month of April, shows distinguished merit. In any year when no such woman candidates is available, the Syndicate may, at its discretion award the prize to any candidate of that year who, in passing at the first appearance the B.A. (Honours) Degree Examination in History (Politics) held in the month of April, shows distinguished merit. Until the B.A. (Honours) Degree examination in History (Politics) is held, the prize shall be awarded to the woman candidate who qualifies herself for the B.A. Pass Degree of the University by passing the whole examination held in April and shows distinguished merit in Political Science.

- (b) In the event of there being no candidate under item (a) above in any year it shall be awarded to the woman candidate who, in passing at the first appearance the Intermediate examination held in the month of March each year, obtains the highest number of marks in Indian History as one of the subjects under Part III.

The Syndicate shall have discretion not to award the prize if in its opinion none of the candidates deserves the award.

4. In the event of the prize not being awarded in any year, the unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.
5. The Senate shall have power consistent with the intention of the donor to make such changes in the conditions of award as new circumstances may render necessary.

3. Sreemati Ishwaradevi Sahni Memorial Prize

Dr. B. Sahni, Lucknow, endowed a sum of Rs. 1,000 for instituting a prize in memory of his mother Sreemati Ishwaradevi Sahni, and the Senate at its meeting held on 9th December 1933, accepted the endowment and approved the following conditions:—

1. The prize shall be called "Sreemati Ishwaradevi Sahni Memorial Prize".
2. The prize shall be of the value of about Rs. 35.
3. The prize shall be awarded in the shape of cash or books annually at the Convocation to a woman candidate who, in passing the B.A. (Hons.) degree final examination, has shown, in the opinion of the Syndicate, distinguished merit.

In the absence of any such candidate in any year, the Syndicate shall be at liberty to award the prize to any woman candidate who, in passing the B.A. Degree Examination at the first appearance in April that year, shows distinguished merit.
4. In the event of the prize not being awarded in any year, the unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.
5. The Senate shall have power to make such changes in the conditions of award, consistent with the intention of the donor, as new circumstances may render necessary.

9. General MacDonald Medal

“General MacDonald Medal” was founded by some friends of the late Major General MacDonald to commemorate his name by the award of a prize and was accepted by the Senate of the Madras University at a meeting held on 31st August 1893. 4. Berhampore—Khallikote College

I. (a) *Historical Account.*—The Berhampore Zillah School was established in 1856, and the college department was opened in February 1878. The College was, until the middle of 1888, a Government institution. It was then transferred to a Committee, and was re-affiliated under the name of the "Native College," Berhampore. In 1893 the name was again changed to the 'Khallikote College' in honour of the Rajah of Khal-

likote who has since endowed it liberally. It is maintained by Govt. grant, and income from fees and endowments.

(b) *Management*.—The College is managed by a Committee of twelve members of which the President is the Sri Rajah Sahib of Khallikote and Atagada and the Vice-President is Mr. Ramakrishna Ratho, M.A., B.L.

II. *Endowments*.—

(a) *Capital* (1) One lakh of rupees given by the Sri Rajah Sahib of Khallikote and Atagada.

(2) Rs. 8,000 given by the late Mr. Tadepalli Sivaramiah Pantulu.

These are for the maintenance of the College and School departments.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc*—The following scholarships are tenable in this College:—

One Pentland Scholarship of the value of Rs. 8 in each of the two Intermediate classes conferred on an Oriya candidate and *one Hosfal Scholarship* of the value of Rs. 5 in the first year Intermediate class and of Rs. 6 in the second year Intermediate class conferred on any candidate who matriculates from this College; *another Pentland Scholarship* of the value of Rs. 3-12-0 in each of the two Intermediate classes conferred on an Oriya candidate. The holders of these scholarships should undertake to prosecute their studies in this college up to the Intermediate standard.

VI. *Sports*.—A trained Physical Training Instructor manages the games and sports of the institution. Provision is made for Cricket, Tennis, Foot-ball, Basket-ball, Volley-ball, Badminton and some minor games.

5. Nellore—Venkatagiri Rajah's College

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The institution was founded by the late Mr. S. Narayanaswami Chetty, B.A., Dewan of Venkatagiri, under the name of Hindu High School, in 1894. When it experienced financial stress, the late Maharajah of Venkatagiri came to its rescue and it has progressed ever since. The institution has borne the name of its patron since 1895. In fulfilment of the promise made by his father, and to commemorate his name, the present Maharajah has raised the High School to the status of a College, and has undertaken to equip and maintain it from the funds of the estate. The College department was formally opened by the Maharajah on July 2, 1920.

(b) *Management*.—The College is managed by a Committee, the strength of which is twelve. The Maharajah of Venkatagiri has two representatives on it, while the old students of the institution have four. The Principal is an *ex-officio* member.

II. *Endowments*.—

(a) *Capital*.—The late Maharajah endowed the institution, when it was a High School with a sum of Rs. 50,000, which is invested in the Nellore Urban bank at 6½ per cent interest per annum.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—The Maharaja of Venkatagiri awards three or four scholarships annually, tenable in the College classes.

6. Parlakimedi—Rajah's College

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The institution has grown out of a primary grade school established in 1857 as the result of local effort. It was originally supported for some years from local subscriptions; but after

a time the Court of Wards, on behalf of the Rajah of Parlakimedi, made a monthly grant of Rs. 70 towards its upkeep. In 1878 it became a First Grade Middle School, in 1884 a First Grade High School, and in 1896 it was raised to a Second Grade College and was affiliated to the Madras University. In 1890 the Committee of Management was dissolved, when the Court of Wards handed over the administration of the Zamindari to the late Rajah whose agent was, till 1902, the sole Manager of the Institution. The Institution was afterwards directly managed by the Rajah at whose death in 1905 it was again placed along with Zamindari under the management of the Court of Wards acting through its agent, the Collector of Ganjam. In April 1913 the Court of Wards handed over the administration of the Zamindari to the present Rajah and the college is now under his management.

(b) *Management*.—The College is managed by a Governing Body consisting of the Rajah Sahib of Parlakimedi, the Dewan of the Estate and the Principal.

II. *Endowments*.—

(a) *Capital*.—The college has no capital fund of its own and is maintained by Government Grants, fees and liberal contributions from the Parlakimedi Samasthanam.

(b) *Scholarship, Medals, etc.*—There are two Merit Prizes of Rs. 25 each, granted to the students of the Intermediate classes who obtain highest mark in the previous Annual Examination. There are also attached to the College two scholarships, one in the first year class and the other in the second year class, of the relative values of Rs. 6 and Rs. 8 per mensem granted from the Johnston Scholarship Fund, which was formed from public subscriptions and is managed by the Ganjam District Board. Besides these, two Samasthanam scholarships of Rs. 20 (Rs. 25 for three years for those taking an Honours course) a month are granted to two deserving students, who, after passing the Intermediate examination, continue their studies for the B.A. Degree examination. The Samasthanam B.A. scholarships, according to present rules, are recoverable from the students concerned in small monthly instalments without interest after they begin to earn an income—the object being to enable more scholarships to be granted in future years.

V. *Hostel Facilities*.—The College Hostel is housed in a very good building of its own with accommodation for 66 students.

VI *Sports*.—The College Athletic Association is composed of the following Clubs—(i) Cricket, (ii) Hockey, (iii) Football, (iv) Badminton, (v) Lawn Tennis, (vi) Volley-ball and (vii) Tenikoit.

There is a gymnasium attached to the Institution where instruction is given by qualified instructors.

7. Vizagapatam—Mrs. A. V. N. College

I. (a) *Historical Account*:—The institution, which was founded in 1860 by Sir Alexander Grant, Inspector of Schools, Mr. E. Fane, Collector of Vizagapatam, the Maharajah G. N. Gajapathi Rao and Mr. Chendica Venkataswami Naidu, was originally called "The Anglo-Vernacular School" but on its being raised to the status of a Second Grade College and affiliated to the University of Madras, in July 1878, the name was changed to the "Hindu College." In 1892 the late Mr. A. V. Narasinga Rao of Vizagapatam bequeathed a lakh of rupees (besides a building fund of Rs. 15,000) for a College to be named "The Mrs. A. V. Narasingarao College, Vizagapatam." The Managing Committee of the latter College took over the Hindu College on April 1, 1899, as a basis on which to construct the Mrs. Ankitham Venkata Narasingarao College. The funds of the College are lodged in the Government Treasury at Vizagapatam

(b) *Management*:—The funds of the College are administered by a Committee of seven members, viz.

The Collector of the District;

The District Educational Officer;

The three executors of the will of the late Mr. A. V. Narasinga Rao, or their Deputies or Successors.

And two more members elected by the other members of the Committee for a term of two years.

II. *Endowments*:—

(a) *Capital*.—Rs. 1,00,200.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—Two scholarships are awarded each year of the annual value of Rs. 120 in memory of Mr. R. Chandrasekhara Ayyar, formerly Vice-Principal, by his sons, Sir C. V. Raman, Kt., M.A., D.Sc., F.R.S., N.L., and Mr. C. Subrahmanya Aiyar, B.A.

A scholarship of the annual value of Rs. 60 is awarded in memory of the late Dewan Bahadur B. Narayanamurthy Pantulu Garu by the members of his family.

Medals:—

1. Sri Vikrama Deo Varma gold medal awarded annually for proficiency in Physics, II Year Class.
2. Akella Suryanarayanarao gold medal awarded annually by Mrs. A. Suryanarayanarao (Junior) for proficiency in Chemistry, II Year Class.

The hostel is managed, subject to the control of the management of the College, by a committee of 4 members, viz., the Principal who is the warden, the Deputy Warden, and two lecturers nominated by the Principal annually. The Deputy Warden resides in the quarters near the hostel and is responsible for the conduct of the hostel. The Headmaster of the School Department has been the Deputy Warden for the last three years.

VI. *Sports*.—Tennis, Foot-ball, Badminton, Hockey, Volley ball, Base ball and Basket ball are played. The College has a *pucca* Foot-ball and Hockey field just adjacent to the college buildings. A trained Physical Instructor has been appointed to supervise the athletic activities of the boys.

8. Coacnada—Pithapur Rajah's College

I. (a). *Historical Account*.—Established in 1852 through the exertions of Mr. Prendergast, Collector, and Mr. Tulasinga Chettiar, his Sheris tadar, for imparting general education in English and Vernacular to

pupils drawn from all sections of the community, the Institution gradually fell into a languishing condition in course of a decade but was given a fresh impetus in 1862 by Mr. Purvis, the then Collector, and Mr. K. Jagannadham Pantulu, his Deputy. It was endowed with a sum of Rs. 28,000 besides the grant of a spacious building site by the then Rajah of Pithapuram in 1866, in which year it first presented candidates for the Matriculation Examination under the name of Hindu High School. In 1884 it was raised to the status of a Second Grade College when it assumed the present designation of 'Pithapur Rajah's College.' It was under the management of a Council of 21 members for several years up to 3rd August 1909, when it was handed over to the present Maharajah of Pithapuram to be controlled by him as Trustee and Manager with a Committee of 7 comprised of elected and *ex-officio* members besides his own representatives. The College with the Secondary Department was finally transferred to the Maharajah as sole Proprietor at the beginning of the academic year 1926-27, when it was elevated by him to the First Grade. The Institution is thus a permanent charge on the Pithapuram Estate. Since its first transfer to his management, the Maharajah has given the College about Rs. 3,23,912-11-9 for equipment and towards annual deficits.

(b) *Management*.—The Institution is managed by the Maharajah with the help of a Committee of three members nominated by him—Diwan Bahadur Dr. Sir R. Venkataratnam, M.A., L.T., D.Litt. (Andhra) LL.D., the Dewan of the Estate, and the Principal (*ex-officio*), the last named being also both Convener and Correspondent.

II. *Endowments*.—(a) *Capital*. The contingency of the Estate declining the charge at any future time has been provided against by the Maharajah with an endowment of one and a half lakhs in 4 per cent debentures and an additional investment of Rs. 95,000 at 7 per cent.

9 Guntur—Andhra Christian College

I. (a) *Historical Account*:—In the year 1848 the first English school of the Mission was opened in Guntur. Largely from lack of funds and from difficulties arising out of the American Civil War, the School was closed in 1863. In the year 1874 it was re-opened and organised as a High School under the Principalship of Rev. L. L. Uhl, Ph.D., D.D., and from this time the School steadily increased in numbers and influence. The first College class was organised in 1885 and the school was affiliated as a Second Grade College in September of that year.

Through the energetic efforts of Dr. Uhl and friends in America, funds for the development of the College were secured. The Watts Memorial building was erected and was occupied in 1893. Since 1893 the progress of the institution has been steady.

In the years 1916-18 the Mission authorities in America raised a sum of 1,70,000 dollars for the equipment and endowment of the College. With a part of this money the Uhl Memorial Building was erected and the remaining monies are held as endowment for the institution.

During the years 1924-26 a sum of more than eight lakhs was secured by the Mission authorities for the development of the institution. As a step in this direction the College was affiliated as a First Grade College in March 1926.

(b) *Management*:—The College is supported and controlled by the Board of Foreign Mission of the United Lutheran Church in America. The management of the College is vested in the Council of the Indian Mission of the United Lutheran Church, which appoints the Principal and

the Bursar and sanctions the Annual Budget. The Principal is assisted in the general administration of the institution by the College Council appointed by the Mission Council.

In the internal administration of the College the Principal is assisted by the Staff Council, which consists of all the full-time Lecturers on the College Staff.

II. *Endowments*:—(a) *Capital*:—The endowment of the College amounting to 1,50,000 dollars is held by the Home Board, which assumes responsibility for the annual deficit in the recurring expenditure of the institution.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—The College has no endowed scholarships but provision is made annually for the grant of a fixed number of scholarships, usually in the form of fee concessions.

10. Masulipatam—Hindu College

I. (a) *Historical Account*—The Institution was originally founded under the name of the Hindu Anglo-Vernacular School on the 1st January 1856 for the benefit of the Hindu community of these parts, who were anxious in those days to secure a good general education for their children without any interference with their religion. About 1863 the present building which was then a private dwelling house was purchased by the management and the School was removed to it and raised to a High School. The High School has developed in all directions ever since. It was raised to the status of a Second Grade College in 1928 and to that of a First Grade College in 1934.

(b) *Management*.—The College is under a Managing Committee which administers the Hindu College, and its affiliated institutions. The Principal is an *ex-officio* member of the Committee.

There is a College Staff Council consisting of all the members of the College staff to assist the Principal in the internal management of the College.

(a) *Capital*.—An endowment of Rs. 45,000 is earmarked for the College.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—

College Scholarships:—Twelve scholarships are awarded by the college staff Council, every year on the basis of poverty and merit.

V. *Hostel facilities*—There is a Hostel attached to the High School with accommodation for 30 students. 15 College students are accommodated therein. There is a separate Hostel for the College students located in a rental building with accommodation for 30 students.

VI. *Sports*.—The College affords facilities to students for playing Tennis, Badminton, Hockey, Football, Volley-ball, Cricket, Baseball and Tenkoit.

11. Masulipatam—Union Noble College

I. (a) *Historical Account*:—The institution takes its name from the Rev. Robert Turlington Noble, B.A., of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge, who was one of the two missionaries first sent to Masulipatam by the Church Missionary Society in 1841. He opened it with two pupils in 1843, and continued to be in charge without break till his death in 1865. In 1864 the number on the rolls had reached 300, and a collegiate department was opened; the College was raised to first grade status in 1892, with affiliation in Group V. That year was the Jubilee of the College.

The aim of the College is to give to all classes of pupils a high education, in English and Vernacular, based on Christian principles, including a careful study of the Bible and the College forms the backbone of the educational system of the Telugu Mission.

(b) *Management*:—The Governing Body of the College consists of the Lord Bishop of Dornakal, Mr. I. Frazer, I.C.S., Collector of the Kistna District, the Manager of the Noble High School, the Principal of the College (Secretary), the Rev. W. Shuttleworth, Acting Principal, a member of the College staff, and four additional members not connected with the institution with powers to increase the number of members by co-optation.

The College Staff Council consisting of all the members of the College staff, assists the Principal in the internal management of the College.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—

Endowed.—The *Rugby Tomes Scholarship*.—Three Scholarships of Rs. 40 each per annum tenable in the 4th year class, are awarded on the

result of the annual examination of the 3rd year course, one for each branch—I, II and III.

The Nesbit Scholarship.—A Scholarship of Rs. 40 per annum given to the student who comes first among the College students in the Higher Grade Peter Cator Examination.

The Jubilee Scholarships.—Two scholarships each of Rs. 54 per annum tenable in the 3rd year class open to students on the results of a Scholarship Competitive Examination.

The Dharba Venkatasastri Scholarship.—One scholarship of Rs. 35 per annum tenable in the 2nd Year Class awarded to a poor student on the result of the annual examination at the end of the 1st year course.

The Brabazon Scholarships.—Two scholarships of Rs. 56 each per annum, tenable in the 2nd year class awarded on the result of the annual examination of the 1st year class.

Ch. Venkatachalam Scholarship.—One scholarship of Rs. 30 per annum for one year awarded to a poor Christian student in any of the College classes.

Sharp Memorial Scholarship.—One Scholarship of Rs. 30 per annum for one year tenable in the 3rd year class awarded to a poor Christian student.

Rajah of Mirzapur Scholarships.—Two Scholarships of Rs. 60 each per annum (and one of Rs. 80 to a girl student) only to deserving poor in any of the College Classes.

Canon A. Anantam Scholarships.—Two Scholarships of Rs. 60 each per annum, confined to S S.L.C. eligible candidates from Bezwada.

College Scholarships.—One Scholarship of Rs. 54 per annum tenable in the 3rd year class awarded after a competitive examination to the best student passing the Intermediate Examination in the first class.

Three Scholarships of Rs. 42 per annum awarded after a competitive examination in the case of students entering the 1st year class; one of these will be an open scholarship, the second confined to those who have passed the S.S.L.C. from the Noble High School, Masulipatam and the third to those of the Local High Schools.

Dornakal Diocesan Scholarships.—Three scholarships of Rs. 60 each per annum for Poor Christians in the Penn Hostel and Girls Boarding house.

One *G. M. S. Scholarship* of Rs. 54 in the 3rd year class. For Christians only.

One *C. M. S. Scholarship* of Rs. 42 in the 1st year class. For Christians only.

S. P. C. K. (Madras) Scholarships of Rs. 54 and Rs. 42 and less in the 3rd year and 1st year classes confined to confirmed members of the Church of England and S. P. C. K. London through the Bishop of Dornakal, three about Rs. 132 each per annum.

N.B.—In awarding these scholarships, preference will be given to students who can give a satisfactory proof of their poverty. The value of all these scholarships may vary according to the rate of interest and exchange. The Term fees of the College form the first claim on all scholarships. These Scholarships are tenable for one year only and may be reduced or enhanced according to the conduct and progress of the students.

Prizes and Medals.—1. *Sharp Memorial English Literature Prizes* of the value of Rs. 7, 6, 5 and 4 awarded annually after an open examination in General Literature to the 4th, 3rd, 2nd and 1st year classes respectively. The examination is held after the Michaelmas holidays.

2. *Ratnam Memorial Scripture Prizes* for Christian Evidences—open to all. The examination is held in the second week of February. Two prizes of the value of Rs. 12 and Rs. 6 are awarded.

3. A Comparative *Theology Prize* of the value of Rs. 11 is awarded on the result of the same examination (Christian Evidences) open only to Christians.

4. *The South Vallur Zamundar Marriage Prize Medal* of the value of Rs. 12 is given to the best athlete in the College Track and Field events.

5. *College Medals for Oratory.*—These are silver medals awarded on the result of Elocution contests (5 minutes for each student) adjusted by a Committee. One Medal is reserved for competitors from the B.A. classes and the other for those from the Intermediate classes.

V. *Hostel Facilities.*—The Clarke Hostel for non-Christians has accommodation for 60 students, Warden: Rev. P. Ratnaiya, M.A., L.T.

The Sharp Hostel for Christians has accommodation for 30 students; Warden. Rev. J. R. Kalyanaramier, B A , L.T.

The Penn Hostel for Christians called after the Rev. W. C. Penn, M A., Principal of the College, from 1907-1922, has accommodation for 15 to 20 students; Warden, Mr. C. S. Paul, M.A.

The wardens, under the general directions of Principal of the College, are responsible for the direct control of the hostels.

The Kamma Hostel for Kamma students is also recognised by the College. It is under the supervision of M. R. Ry. Kommareddi Pattabhiramayya Garu, Landholder, Masulipatam and is periodically visited by one of the Lecturers of the College.

VI. *The Noble College Athletic Association.*—The games and sports of the College are carried on under the management of the Noble College Athletic Association which consists of a President, who is one of the Lecturers, elected by the members of the Association, a Vice-President who is a member of the B.A. Senior Class, the Captains of all the games played in the College, class representatives from each of the classes and two Lecturers elected by the staff. The Principal and the Bursar are ex-officio members of the Association. The games fund is made of games fees contributed by the staff and the students of the College. An annual budget is drawn at the beginning of each College year apportioning funds for the several games for the year. Cricket, Foot-ball, Hockey, Tennis, Badminton, Volley-ball and Base-ball are played throughout the year. Each game is under the charge of a student Captain and a President who is a Lecturer. The Association is under the general supervision of a Physical Training Instructor guided by the Principal.

Matches between staff and students are a common feature of the activity of the College in sports. The College competes in the various tournaments that are held in the Northern Circars and very often has proved successful.

12. Rajahmundry—Government Arts College

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The College was originally instituted as a Zilla School in 1853. In 1868 it was raised to the rank of a provincial School. It was raised to the Standard of a Second Grade College in 1873. In 1877 it became a First Grade College. The High School classes were discontinued in 1885.

The College has provided instruction in the B.Sc. Courses from July '30 in Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry, both as main and subsidiary subjects.

The courses in Mathematics and Philosophy for the B.A., Degree examination were given up with effect from July '30.

(b) *Management*.—The College is maintained by Government.

(3) *The Bhaskara Rao Prize.*—Capital Rs. 200. Awarded to the best essay in Telugu written by a student of the College on a subject selected by a committee appointed by the Principal.

(4) *The Young Scholarship.*—Capital Rs. 900. Awarded annually to the student of the II year University class of this College, adjudged by the administrators of the scholarship fund to be the best student of his class, who continues his studies in the Third Year University class of this College; shall not be held with any other scholarship.

(5) *Poor Scholars' Fund Endowment Scholarship.*—Capital Rs. 3,000. Awarded annually to poor and deserving students in such proportions as may seem fit to the administrators (the Principal and the Senior Lecturer of the College.)

(6) *The Muhammadan Scholarships.*—Capital Rs. 9,750. A limited number of scholarships for poor Mahammadan students. The monthly value of the scholarships ranges from Rs. 7 to Rs. 3.

(7) *The Dharwada Venkatakrisna Rao's Scholarship.*—Capital Rs. 1,500. Of the yearly value of Rs. 52 the scholarship is administered by the Principal to the most deserving and well behaved student of the third year class in the college. Tenable for two years, but may be forfeited if the scholar is not promoted to the fourth year class on other than medical grounds.

(8) *The Rajamundry Coronation Durbar Endowment Medal.*—Capital Rs. 900. Awarded annually to the successful student in the B.A. Senior class of the College who obtains the highest number of marks in English in the B.A. Degree Examination.

13. Vizianagaram—Maharajah's College

I. (a) *Historical Account*—The institution was founded in 1857 by Sir Viziamaraj, Maharajah of Vizianagaram. He made it a High School in 1868 and a Second Grade College in 1879. His son, Sir Anand Raja raised its standard to that of the B.A. in 1883.

(b) *Management*.—The Government of the college is conducted by the Rajah Sahib Bahadur of Vizianagaram in consultation with the Principal of the College. There is also a College Council consisting of the Chief Lecturers of the College, which considers questions of internal management such as holidays, promotions, etc.

II. *Endowments*.—(a) *Capital*—There are no capital endowments.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—

(1) Six scholarships of the annual value of Rs 100 each are awarded to students of the Junior B.A. Class on the results of the Intermediate Examination. They are continued in the IV year class also provided the conduct and progress of the students are satisfactory.

(2) One scholarship of value varying from Rs. 36 to 48 per annum founded to perpetuate the memory of the late Mr. C. Chandrasekhara Sastri, first Principal of the College, is awarded to a deserving student of the Junior B.A. Class. This also is continued in the IV year class if the student's conduct and progress are satisfactory.

(3) Two scholarships of the annual value of Rs. 50 each are awarded to students of the Junior Intermediate Class on the results of the School Final Examination. These are continued in the Senior Intermediate class if the conduct and progress of the student are satisfactory.

Medals.—(1) Two gold medals endowed by Rajah Sri Surj Bux Singh Jee Rajah Sahib of Kasmanda and named after him are given yearly to two students of the College who distinguish themselves in the B.A. Examination.

(2) Two gold medals named after the late Dr. Quinn, who was once Superintendent of the Maharaja's Hospital in Vizianagaram, are awarded, one to the best student in the Mathematics group and the other to the best students in the History group of the Intermediate Class, on the results of the Intermediate Examination subject to certain conditions.

14. Rajahmundry—Government Training College

I. (a) Historical Account.—

The beginnings are to be traced to the Elementary Normal School opened by the District Board, Godavari, in 1883, which seven years later was raised to the rank of a Secondary Grade Normal School, and, after a

lapse of two more years, was taken over by the Government in 1892. With the opening of the L.T. class in February 1894 the school attained the status of a college, and was placed under the supervision of the Principal of the local Govt. Arts College. The Union High School, then transferred by the private managers to the Government, served as a Model School, and the High School classes with the L.T. and Secondary Training classes were held in the Arts College, while the lower departments worked in a rented building in the centre of Innespet. This arrangement continued till 1899, when, on the completion of the present building, the whole Training College with the Model School, was removed to it. It then consisted of the L.T., Upper Secondary, Lower Secondary, and Primary departments with the Model School which had only the forms from the first to the sixth. The Vice-Principal, an officer of the Provincial Educational Service, managed the work with a competent staff of teachers, under the superintendence of the Principal of the Arts College.

The Training College became fairly popular, and the L.T. class numbered 17 in 1910. The outlay incurred on account of the College was, however, considered to far outstrip its usefulness, and the L.T. class was removed from Rajahmundry and amalgamated with the Teachers' College, Saidapet, in July 1911, when that College was enlarged and reorganised to train annually about one hundred graduates.

The provision for the training of the Telugu graduates at Saidapet was soon felt to be inadequate, especially in view of the more pressing demands of the Southern districts. The proposal (which had been under consideration for some time past) to reopen a Teachers' College for the Telugu districts at Rajahmundry was sanctioned by Government in G.O. No. 580, Education, dated 26th May 1916 but had to be postponed on financial grounds to the year 1917. The College has now been placed under a separate Principal; and the institution is independent of the Arts College.

The new Training College was opened on the 2nd July 1917, and since then about 1,063 graduates have undergone training.

(b) *Management.*—The College is managed by the Madras Government under the control of the Directors of Public Instruction, Madras.

II. *Endowments.*—There are no endowments belonging to the college department.

III. *Special Subjects Taught* —

In the College Department all the students undergoing Secondary training as well as the students of the Mathematics, History and Geography sections of the B.Ed. class take a course in wood-work. For the B.Ed. Examination the students are prepared in the special methods of teaching Mathematics, Physical Science, History and Geography.

IV. *Library*.—The library contains 11,823 volumes. This figure includes the volumes in the sectional libraries.

V. *Hostel Facilities*.—A hostel is attached to the College exclusively for the benefit of the B.Ed. students.

VI. *Sports*.—Hockey, Foot-ball, Badminton, Base-Ball, Basket-ball; Ring Tennis, Tennis and Volley-ball are played. There are two Tennis courts, a Badminton court, Volley-ball court, a Ring tennis court and Chedugudu court.

15. *Vizagapatam—The Medical College*

I. (a) 1. *Historical Account*.—In response to the requests of the people of the Telugu Districts, the Government of Madras decided in 1923 to establish a Medical College at Vizagapatam. The College opened in July 1923 in the old hospital buildings.

2. Since then two new block of buildings have been erected, complete with all modern appliances and up-to-date in respect of fully equipped laboratories and anatomical rooms, etc., where the various classes comprising the Medical Courses are held.

3. There is also a large modern Hospital equipped with the most up-to-date appliances with more than 300 beds in which the clinical teaching of the course is carried on. A new maternity unit of 40 beds and a new ophthalmic unit of 80 beds have been added. Diseases of great incidence treated are beriberi, deficiency diseases, elephantiasis and cataract and general surgery. There are also Tuberculosis, Venereal, Skin, Dental Orthopaedic and Ear, Nose and Throat diseases departments attached to the Hospital, where clinical instruction in the subjects is given to the students.

4. The Government of Madras have decided that the number of students admitted yearly shall be limited to 50 making a total of 300, and that preference be given in selection to students from the Telugu districts.

(b) *Management*.—The Government of the College is vested in a Principal aided by a consultative Council composed of all the Professors and of any other members who may be appointed by the Government, subject to the general control of the Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras.

II. *Endowments*.—(a) *Capital*.—Nil. The net deficit is met by Government.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—Rs. 681.

V. *Hostel Facilities*.—There is a Hostel with accommodation only for 48 students, situated in the Hospital Compound. It is under the supervision of a Warden.

VI. *Sports*.—There is no sports ground at present, but arrangements have been made with the Superintendent of Police for the use of the Police ground for two days a week and on other days when not required by the Police. It is hoped that ground will be available for the College during the ensuing year.

16. Chittigudur (Musulipatam)—Narasimha Sanskrit College

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The College was founded in July 1923 by Mr. S. T. G. Varadachary, M.A. (Hons.), in memory of his late revered father Sriman S. T. G. Narasimhacharyulu Garu.

(b) *Management*.—The College was registered under the Companies Act of 1869 and placed from July 1928 under a Managing Committee.

II. *Endowments*.—The College is maintained out of the income from the permanent fund that is being raised at present. The fund stands now at Rs. 18,000.

III. *Subjects in which it is recognised.*—(1) Vidya Praveena—Vyakarana and Sahitya, (2) Ubhayabhasha Praveena—Sanskrit and Telugu, (3) Proficiency course in Comparative Philology. Attached to it there is also an advanced section, preparing students for the Sanskrit Entrance Examination conducted by Government.

IV. *Library.*—The institution possesses a decent library bearing on several branches of Sanskrit literature, Telugu and the researches of Western Scholars. Provision is made for adding to it annually.

V. *Hostel Facilities.*—All students are provided with free lodging. There is a boarding house attached to the institution which contains three sections, namely, (1) Smartha, (2) Vaishnavite, and (3) non-Brahmin. Boarders in each section cook their food by turns, and manage their own sections. The supervision of students outside class hours is done by the Principal and the other members of the staff who are also provided with quarters. A few students are provided with free-boarding by the Principal himself.

VI. *Sports.*—Students are encouraged to learn swimming, gardening and a few Indian sports.

17. Kovvur—Andhra Geervana Vidyapitham

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The Andhra Geervana Vidyapitham was founded on the banks of the Godavary by the late Tallapragada Suryanarayana Rao, Pleader, Kovvur, on the 20th October 1912 for resuscitating Oriental Literature and Culture and for promoting research work therein as well as for fair and impartial criticism of the present theological beliefs and customs of the Hindus in the light of their ancient books. In this Vidyapitham, a Sanskrit College was established which since April 1932, goes by the name of “Sree Vadrevu Jogayamma Gari Veda Shastra Pathsala” as she gave a permanent donation of Rs. 1,000 per annum to this Vidyapitham.

The College is situated very near the Railway Station in buildings of its own, consisting of the main building, boarding house and three minor buildings for Pandits, constructed at a cost of Rs. 25,000. The College premises is nearly 5 acres in extent. The institution has at present lands about 50 acres in extent that fetch an annual income of Rs. 1,290. There are two temples attached to the Institution, one dedicated to Siva, and the other to Vishnu.

(b) *Management*.—The Vidyapitham and its college are under the management of a Committee registered under Act XXI of 1860. The Committee consists of 8 permanent and 4 temporary members.

II. *Endowments*.—Mr. Valluri Suryanarayana Rao, B.A., B.L., & L.T., Advocate, Kovvur, the present Secretary, gave a permanent donation of Rs. 12,000 to the Vidyapitham both for the research and the teaching work therein under a trust deed dated 9th April 1931. Mr. Garapati Ramachendriah and Mr. Tallapragada Ramachandra Rao executed registered deeds creating charges on their landed properties for Rs. 100 each per annum in favour of the Vidyapitham and have thus enrolled themselves as permanent members of the Committee. So also Mr. Dinamraja Venkatachalam gifted the whole of his father's library consisting of books on Vedas and Sastias valued at Rs. 2,000 to the Vidyapitham and also land about ac 5.0 in extent for the improvement of the library and thus became a permanent member of the Committee. The Government gave a grant of Rs. 550 last year.

III. *Subjects in which the college is recognised*.—

IV. *Library*.—The library consists of about 800 Sanskrit books, 600 Telugu books, 200 English books and 40 Hindi books.

18. Nellore—Sanskrit College

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The institution has been in existence for over 40 years. It was first started in the year 1891 with the help of private subscriptions, with one teacher for teaching Sanskrit Kavyas, and another to teach Yejurveda. After a time some donations were collected. The late Ayalur Venkaya Pantulu Garu made an endowment from which a small monthly income was ensured. This was supplemented by other local subscriptions and donations. The Pathasala was registered in the year 1926 under the Act XXI of 1860. In the year 1925 application was made to the Madras University for the recognition of the institution for the Siromani course in Vyakarana and Sahitya groups and the Syndicate accorded its sanction for the same.

(b) *Management*.—The institution is managed by a committee consisting of seven members with Rao Bahadur N. Lakshmana Rao Pantulu Garu, Retired Subordinate Judge as President.

II. *Endowments*.—The institution has a funded capital of Rs. 23,500. This and a monthly payment of Rs. 10 from Ayalur Venkaiah Pantulu's charities form the only endowments. The other resources are monthly subscriptions and the government grant.

III. *Subjects in which recognised*.—

Vidya Praveena: Vyakarana and Sahitya groups.

IV. *Library*.—The Library consists of one thousand and two hundred volumes nearly.

V. *Hostel Facilities*.—The institution has a free boarding house run on behalf of the trustees of Sri Venugopala Swami Varu in which about 34 students are boarded free as shown below:—

- 21 by the Venugopalaswami temple.
- 1 by Mr. T. V. Sivaramayya, B.A., B.L.

These students live in the premises under the direct supervision of the Principal and three other teachers who also live in the premises in buildings constructed for their use. Two other buildings have since been put up to serve as students' quarters, one by Mr. Menakur Balarami Reddi and the other by Mr. Bodireddi Ranga Reddi at a cost of Rs. 1,200 and Rs. 4,000 respectively.

19. Parlakimedi—Rajah's Sanskrit College

I. (a) *Historical Account*—The Parlakimedi Samasthanam used to pay monthly allowances to some local Pandits who were managing two old-type Sanskrit Schools, one for the Oriya boys and the other for the Telugu boys. In 1914 the present Rajah Sahib had these two Schools amalgamated into one institution known as the Rajah's Sanskrit College, consisting of two sections, Oriya and Telugu. In the year 1915 it was recognised by the University of Madras as fit to prepare students for the Oriental Title Vidvan Examination in Sanskrit and Oriya as co-ordinate languages; and the Andhra University permitted it to open the Sahitya Vidya Praveena Course from July 1931.

(b) *Management.*—The internal management of the College is vested in the Principal, certain important matters being discussed and recommended to the management by a Committee consisting of 6 members.

II. *Endowments*.—The Rajah Sahib of Parlakimedi Samasthanam is the patron of the institution and bears every item of expenditure.

III. *Subjects in which it is recognised*.—

20. Rajahmundry—Andhra Yuvathi Samskrita Kalasala

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—M.R.Ry. Nalam Ramalingiah Garu of Cocanada founded the Vysya Seva Sadanam in 1920 an institution for the educational and cultural advancement of women and girls. The institution provides instruction in English, Telugu, Sanskrit, Hindi, History, Geography and Arithmetic up to the lower secondary standard besides music (Veena, Harmonium and Vocal), garment making, embroidery and needlework, fretwork, etc. The founder endowed the institution with landed property yielding an annual income of Rs. 3,500 and a sum of Rs. 50,000 for acquiring a building. On 31-5-1933 a spacious upstairs building on the banks of the Godavary was purchased for Rs. 36,000 for the Seva Sadanam. Another building to the east of the same was purchased for Rs. 8,000 for the use of the Andhra Yuvathi Samaskrita Kalasala.

The educational branch of the Seva Sadan was recognised by the Andhra University in 1931 as a Sanskrit College for women preparing students for the Ubhayabhasha Praveena (B) and the lower classes were recognised by the Government as an Advanced Sanskrit School for girls. There are at present 120 girls and women studying in the various classes.

The College is doing very good work and the management hopes that women all over the Andhra Desa will take advantage of the College, the only institution preparing ladies for the Oriental Title Examinations.

(b) *Management*.—The College is managed by the President Founder with the help of an advisory committee.

II. *Endowment*.—Rs. 15,000. A sum of Rs. 15,000 is earmarked for the college from out of the funds of the Seva Sadanam, the income from which is spent for the college. The deficit is met from the funds of the Seva Sadanam.

III. *Subjects in which recognised*.—Ubhayabhasha Praveena—Telugu and Sanskrit.

IV. *Library*.—Attached to the Sava Sadan there is a well furnished library bearing on several branches of Samskrit and Telugu literature and a Reading Room with Telugu newspapers and magazines, and the students of the College are allowed free use of the library and reading room.

V. *Hostel Facilities*.—All the Vysya girls coming from the moffusil and studying in the College are given free lodging in the Seva Sadanam and some of the poor Vysya widows are given free boarding. There is a separate section for Brahmins who cook their own food by turns and manage their own section. The Vysya and Sudra girls are given boarding from the general kitchen. The Principal of the College is also the superintendent of the Seva Sadanam and the hostel.

. VI. *Sports*:—Students are encouraged to take part in games and sports such as Ring tennis, Badminton, Ping-pong, Nrutyam, etc.

VII. *Strength, Rates of fees, etc.*:—Women and girls of all castes are given free education in the school and college classes and free lodging in the hostel subject to accommodation being available. The total strength of the College and School is Rs. 120.

21. Tenali—Sanskrit College

22. Vizianagaram—Maharajah's Sanskrit College

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The institution was founded by Sir Vijarama Gajapati Raj, K.C.I.E., Maharaja of Vizianagaram in 1861. The Maharaja also opened about the same time a boarding house for the benefit of the students of the Sanskrit School. After his death, his successors, Maharaja Sir Ananda Gajapati Raj, G.C.I.E., and Sri Vijarama Gajapati Raj continued to maintain the College on the original lines.

In 1900 the College was affiliated to the Government Sanskrit College, Benares, and the students were sent up for the first time for its examinations in 1901.

When the Madras University instituted Oriental Titles Examination, the College was approved for the Vyakarana and Nyaya Branches of the Siromani Examination and Sanskrit and Telugu of the Vidwan. The College has been sending up students for the Oriental Titles Examination from 1915. It has been subsequently approved for the Mimamsa and Sahitya branches of the Siromani and also for certificates of Proficiency in Indian Philosophy and Indo-European Philology. Since 1926, when the Andhra University was established the College commands the jurisdiction of the University.

The College has a Secondary Department consisting of the Elementary and Advanced classes. It has also a Vedic Department attached to it in which provision is made for teaching the Rig Veda as well as the Yajur Veda.

(b) *Management*.—The institution is maintained by the Raja Sahib of Vizianagaram.
