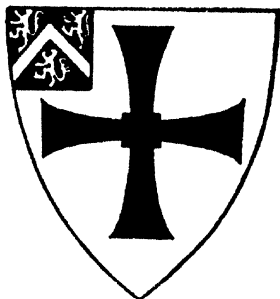

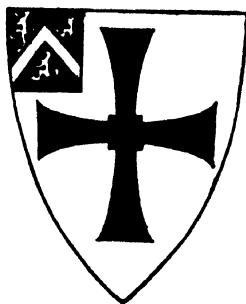

HISTORICAL NOTE.

The Durham Colleges form one of the two Divisions of the University of Durham, the other Division being King's College in Newcastle

The University was founded in Durham in 1832, after two abortive schemes in earlier centuries. When Henry VIII seized the property of the monasteries a scheme was proposed for the establishment of a college at Durham, but nothing came of it. Again during the Commonwealth a similar plan was made, and in May 1657 letters patent were issued for the foundation of a corporate body to be known as "the Provost, Fellows and Scholars of the College in Durham of the Foundation of Oliver, Lord Protector," and the Provost and Fellows were actually nominated. A proposal that the College should have power to grant degrees roused the opposition of Oxford and Cambridge and Richard Cromwell promised that nothing should be done to the prejudice of the two ancient Universities. The Protectorate came to an end and so did the College.

The actual foundation was due to the efforts of William Van Mildert, Bishop of Durham, and the Dean and Chapter of Durham. From the beginning the founders contemplated a residential system on the lines of Oxford and Cambridge. "An Act to enable the Dean and Chapter of Durham to appropriate part of the property of their church to the establishment of a University in connection therewith" was passed in 1832. Temporary accommodation was provided in the house known as the Archdeacons Inn on Palace Green and the first students came into residence in 1833. By the generosity of the Bishop of Durham an Order in Council was obtained in 1837 appropriating Durham Castle, one of the palaces of the Palatinate See, to the uses of the University, which thus obtained a College Building which has few rivals in England or elsewhere.

In 1846 an attempt was made to provide for men of limited means an alternative to residence in the Castle by the establishment of a hall of residence in which expenses were reduced by providing all meals in common at a fixed charge and by letting the rooms furnished. The name given to the new institution was Bishop Hatfield's Hall in memory of a fourteenth century Bishop of Durham who had been a generous benefactor to university education. The new Hall was very successful and soon had to be enlarged. A second hall known as Cosin's Hall, was opened in 1851 but it proved unsuccessful and was closed in 1864. Non-Collegiate Students were first admitted to the University in 1871 and within twenty years had grown sufficiently numerous to be an important section of the student body. They were under the charge of a

Censor, and in May, 1947, the body became known as St Cuthbert's Society. With the formation of these additional bodies of students, the Castle came to be known as University College.

In the early part of the twentieth century two private halls were founded, St Chad's in 1904 and St John's in 1909. These were foundations with governing bodies of their own. At first they were merely halls of residence, but in 1919 they each took the style and title of College. A similar change was made at Hatfield. Bishop Hatfield's Hall became Hatfield College, and the Principal became the Master.

Women have been admitted to Durham since the nineties. In 1895 Senate petitioned the Crown for a supplementary charter enabling degrees to be conferred on women. In Michaelmas Term, 1896 the first four women students were matriculated, all of them members of St Hild's College. In 1899 Abbey House on Palace Green was opened as a Women's Hostel. Later other houses had to be taken as well, and by resolution of the Council of the Durham Colleges in 1919, the Women's Hostel became known as St Mary's College. Home Students were first admitted in 1895, and in 1947 the body of women non-collegiate students became known as St Aidan's Society, with its own Principal.

The three Teachers' Training Colleges in Durham, the College of the Venerable Bede for men, and St Hild's and Neville's Cross Colleges, for women, have formed an increasingly close connection with the University, and now most of the students of Bede College and a proportion of those of the other two colleges, read for the degrees of the University.

The University is now controlled by new Statutes which came into force in 1937. Under these Statutes, the Durham Division is governed by a Council, an Academic Board and a Warden. Since that date the long and costly task of preserving the Castle, the fabric of which threatened to collapse shortly after the War of 1914-18, has been completed. The Science Laboratories in South Road were built in 1924, extended in 1930 and again in 1948. An adjacent block, primarily for the Departments of Mathematics and Geography, was completed in 1951.

A new wing constructed for Hatfield College was opened in September, 1950, and a new building for St Mary's College, which has hitherto been housed in seven different buildings, will be completed on a site to the south of the river in 1952.

The Durham Division of the University is organised on a collegiate basis and all students are admitted in the first instance to a College or a Society. Teaching is, however, organised by the Division and not by the individual Colleges. Students from all Colleges attend the same courses.

MATRICULATION.

A student must be qualified to matriculate before being admitted to a course for any degree. The regulations for matriculation appear in full on pages 5-19 of the University Calendar, Volume II. These regulations apply to all students entering the University in or after October 1951.

A student who has obtained a complete qualification to matriculate under the old regulations, prior to 1st October 1951, will be permitted to matriculate on it after 1st October 1951.

Special requirements

A candidate for the B.A. in General Studies or for the B.A. with Honours must include in his general qualification to matriculate a qualification in Latin or Classical Greek at not less standard than the Ordinary level of the General Certificate of Education Examination.

Under the Regulations for the B.A. in General Studies and the B.A. with Honours, candidates entering certain Honours Schools, or offering certain languages, must comply with further requirements in regard to languages. Details appear in the regulations for the B.A. in General Studies and the B.A. with Honours.

A candidate for the Pass Degree of B.Sc. or for the Degree of B.Sc. with Honours must include in his general qualification to matriculate a qualification in one of the following subjects —

Mathematics, Additional Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Chemistry-with-Physics, Botany, Zoology, Biology, Geography, Geology, General Science.

ADMISSION.

APPLICATION

All students must be members either of a College or of a Society. Members of a College normally live in College. Members of a Society normally live in approved lodgings. Candidates for admission should first apply to the College or Society which they wish to join. They may find it advisable to apply to more than one body, but if they do so they must list the Colleges or Societies to which they are applying on a Preference Slip. This Preference Slip will be sent to intending applicants together with a Form of Application for admission. All candidates must complete it, whether they apply to one or more College or Society, but they must in no circumstances complete more than one Preference Slip. The Slip must be sent to the College or Society of the candidate's first preference, together with the Form of Application for admission to that College or Society. Candidates are advised to apply as early as possible in the session preceding that in which they hope to begin residence. The normal last day for receiving applications is 31st January, but late applications may be considered in special circumstances.

Applications for admission should be addressed to the Master or Principal, except in the cases of Hatfield College (The Senior Tutor), and St Cuthbert's Society (The Secretary).

For students who are teachers in training under the Ministry of Education, these fees are reduced in accordance with the Ministry's scale. UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

University College is maintained by the Council of the Durham Colleges and is administered by a Governing Body appointed by Council. University College is the oldest College in the University and dates from the opening of the University in 1833. It was founded on the residential system and from its earliest days its students have resided in Durham Castle. Now that this accommodation alone is quite inadequate, students are also housed in modern buildings adjoining and in Lumley Castle. The Great Hall of Durham Castle is the College dining hall.

Scholarships and exhibitions offered by the Council of the Durham Colleges are tenable at University College and there are a few scholarships and exhibitions founded by private benefactors restricted to University College, notably the Pemberton Studentship, the Pemberton Scholarship, the Solway Fellowship and the Skene Bursaries.

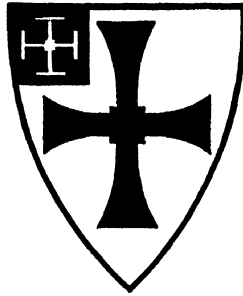

ST. CHAD'S COLLEGE

ST. MARY'S COLLEGE

St. Mary's College, having opened in 1899 as a Hall of Residence for Women Students, was constituted a College in 1920, and is maintained by the Council of the Durham Colleges.

Since 1920 its headquarters have been in one of the prebendal houses of the Dean and Chapter. Students are also accommodated in five houses nearby.

A new College for 120 students is now being built to the south of the City, within fifteen minutes' walk of Palace Green. It is hoped that this will be ready for occupation early in 1952.

All the Entrance Scholarships and Exhibitions offered by the Council of the Durham Colleges are open to women, except where otherwise stated. The Winifred Foster Scholarship, awarded on the results of the Durham Colleges Open Entrance Scholarship Examination is open only to women.

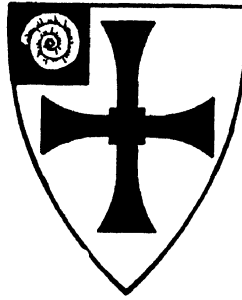

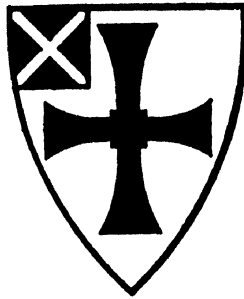

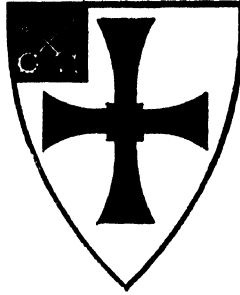

FELLOWSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS AND PRIZES.

NOTE.—Full information on the Fellowships, Scholarships and Prizes referred to below may be obtained from the Secretary, 38, North Bailey, Durham.

RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS.

Two Research Fellowships, one in Arts, and one in Science, each of the annual value of £600, tenable for two or three years.

SOLWAY FELLOWSHIP

The Solway Fellowship, established by Miss U M Davis in memory of the late J Roland Davis, M A, is restricted to members of University College. The Fellowship which is at present held by Dr J. McIntyre, was founded "to promote the study of Christianity generally and especially the study of Christianity in modern social conditions."

RESEARCH STUDENTSHIPS

Nine Research Studentships are open to members of one of the Durham Colleges, who must have taken the B A or B.Sc. Degree of the University of Durham with Honours. Each Studentship is of the annual value of £200, which may be supplemented, and tenable for two years. Candidates must enter their names on or before 31st May, 1952.

The Pemberton Studentship, a Research Studentship in Science, is open to students holding an Honours Degree in Science of the University of Durham, having pursued a course of study in the Durham Division of the University. It is of the annual value of £200, and is tenable for not more than two years. The student is required to reside in University College.

ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

Ten Foundation Entrance Scholarships and Exhibitions, open to men and women intending to enter on residence in one of the Colleges of the Durham Division, will be awarded by examination in January 1952. The value of an Exhibition is £40 per annum and of a Scholarship £70 per annum, but any sum awarded in excess of £30 per annum will depend upon the financial circumstances of the candidate.

All the Foundation Awards, the Pemberton Scholarship, the Pears Scholarship, the Hatfield Scholarship, the Winifred Foster Scholarship, the Ellerton Scholarship, the Theological Honours Exhibition, the Horsfall Scholarships, the Christopher Mather Scholarship, the Winchester Scholarship, and, in certain circumstances, some of the other awards listed below, are eligible for supplementation by the Ministry of Education to the full value of a State Scholarship.

The following Entrance Scholarships are also awarded on the results of the Foundation Entrance Scholarships examination.

ELLERTON SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, tenable for three years. Preference will be given to candidates who have received their education at Richmond Grammar School. Candidates must not have exceeded their twentieth year, and must be in need of assistance.

PEARS SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, open to candidates in Arts and Theology. Other things being equal, preference will be given to natives of Witton-le-Wear, or Bishop Auckland.

PEMBERTON SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, in Pure Science, tenable at University College. Other things being equal, preference will be given to a native of the County of Durham.

The **HATFIELD SCHOLARSHIP**, of £40 a year, tenable in Hatfield College.

WANSBROUGH SCHOLARSHIP, of £50 a year, in Arts, tenable at Hatfield College and open to candidates who intend to take Honours in Theology.

THREE HORSFALL SCHOLARSHIPS, of £40 a year each, tenable at St Chad's College, are awarded by the Council of St. Chad's College to a candidate in Arts or Theology who is a candidate for Holy Orders in the Church of England. Candidates must not have exceeded their twentieth year.

CHRISTOPHER MATHER SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, tenable at St John's College, is awarded by the Council of St. John's College in alternate years to a candidate in Arts or Theology who is a candidate for Holy Orders in the Church of England. Candidates must not have exceeded their twentieth year. (Available in 1952).

AN ORGAN SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, tenable for up to four years in University College and awarded on the results of the Entrance Scholarships examination, and of a practical test at the organ. (Available in 1952).

AN ORGAN SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, tenable for up to four years in Hatfield College and awarded on the results of the Entrance Scholarships examination, and of a practical test at the organ. (Available in 1952).

WINIFRED FOSTER SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, tenable in the first instance for one year, open to women candidates between the ages of 17½ years and 22 years, and awarded by the Principal of St. Mary's College, and the Principal of St Aidan's Society. (Not available in 1952).

WINCHESTER SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, tenable in St Chad's College or St John's College for any necessary period up to five years by a candidate for ordination in the Church of England. The Scholarship is awarded by a Board of Electors on the results of the Entrance Scholarships examination.

The following Scholarships, available on entrance, are awarded by special procedure or by external Bodies.

THE LINDSAY SCHOLARSHIP, of £40-£60 a year, is restricted to pupils of Durham School.

THE SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP, of £30 a year, tenable for three years, and the **SCHOOL EXHIBITION** of £28 a year, are also restricted to pupils of Durham School, and are in the gift of the Headmaster of Durham School.

PROVINCE OF DURHAM MASONIC SCHOLARSHIP, of the maximum value of £60 a year, tenable either at Durham or Newcastle. For detailed conditions application should be made to the Secretary, the Masonic Scholarship Committee, No 8 The Esplanade, Sunderland, on or before the first day in March. This Scholarship is confined to sons and daughters whose fathers are or were subscribing members of a Lodge of the Province of Durham.

KEPIER SCHOLARSHIP (two), each tenable for three years, for candidates resident in the Ancient Parish of Houghton-le-Spring, and awarded on the results of the July Entrance examination of the University of Durham. Candidates should apply to the Secretary of the Kepier Trustees, c/o Messrs Ellis & Martin, Solicitors, Seaham Harbour.

BISHOP FRODSHAM SCHOLARSHIP, of £10 a year, tenable in the first instance for three years, open to candidates for Holy Orders resident in the Rural Deanery of Halifax. Further information may be obtained from the Registrar, 46, North Bailey, Durham.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR STUDENTS IN RESIDENCE

- **UNIVERSITY HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP** of £20, tenable for one year.

UNIVERSITY MODERN LANGUAGES (TRAVELLING) SCHOLARSHIP of £50, tenable for one year (one scholarship each in French and German).

THEOLOGICAL HONOURS EXHIBITION of £40, tenable until its holder has taken his first degree, open to candidates who intend to read for Honours in Theology, and awarded on the result of the First Year Examinations.

VAN MILDERT SCHOLARSHIP of £50, tenable for one year and the **VAN MILDERT EXHIBITION** of £25, both open to candidates for the Final General Examination who wish to pursue a course of study in Theology.

GISBORNE SCHOLARSHIPS, each of about £26, and tenable for two years, open to candidates for the First Year Examination in Arts holding no other Scholarship or Exhibition and also to students entering from the Theological Colleges associated with the University.

- **MALTBY EXHIBITION** of about £9 a year, for a student of limited means and fair attainments, with preference to a member of Hatfield College.

- **BARRY SCHOLARSHIP**, of £30 for one year, for students engaged in the study of Theology, being members of the Church of England.

NEWBY SCHOLARSHIP, of £40 a year, usually awarded on the result of the First Year Examinations in Arts.

DE BURY SCHOLARSHIP of £75 a year, for students who intend to take Holy Orders in the diocese of Durham.

LIGHTFOOT SCHOLARSHIP, of £58 for one year, for students who have taken an Honours degree in Arts and wish to read for the Diploma in Theology.

JENKYN'S SCHOLARSHIPS (two), each of about £30 a year, for students who wish to read Theology for a fourth or fifth year.

SKENE BURSARIES—Awards are restricted to members of University College. For the time being they are reserved for candidates of sufficient merit undertaking research. Application should be made to the Master of University College.

PRIZES.

THE THOMPSON HISTORY PRIZE of the value of £10 is open to graduates of the Durham Division of not more than six years' standing from the degree of B A. The subject for 1952 is, " Bishop Shute Barrington "

THE LONG READING PRIZE of the value of £5 5s 0d, is awarded on the results of a reading competition which will be held in the Easter Term, 1952.

THE GABBETT PRIZE of the value of £11, for Mental and Moral Philosophy, is open to graduates of the Durham Division of not more than six years' standing from the degree of B.A. The subject for 1952 is, " Philosophy and Language "

THE GIBSON PRIZE of the value of £15, offered for the best Essay on British Archaeology or Local History, is open to graduates of the Durham Division of not more than six years' standing from the degree of B A. The subject for 1952 is, " The economic consequences of Hadrian's Wall "

THE CAPEL CURE PRIZE, of the value of £2, will be offered in the Epiphany Term, 1952, for the best sermon, to candidates for Ordination who are in residence and have passed the First Year Examination in Arts after three terms' residence in the University.

THE MALTBY PRIZE, of the value of £5, is open to all resident students of the Durham Division of the University, of not more than nine terms' standing from matriculation, and is awarded for an essay on some subject of Classical Literature, Archaeology or History Subject for 1952 "Rhetoric before Demosthenes"

THE OGLE AND FOX PRIZE, of the value of £9 19s 4d. (in books), may be awarded on the result of the First Year Examination in June 1952, to the best candidate pursuing his (or her) studies as a student in residence in the Durham Division, such candidate not being the holder of any University Scholarship or Exhibition.

THE UNIVERSITY CLASSICAL PRIZE is awarded on the results of the First Public Examination.

THE JUBILEE PRIZE, of the value of £3 3s 0d, will be offered in Epiphany Term 1951, for an English Essay, and is open to students in residence in the Durham Division who have not completed twelve terms from matriculation The subject for 1952 is, "The importance of Shaw as a dramatist"

THE GLADSTONE MEMORIAL PRIZE, of books to the value of £5, will be awarded in the Easter Term 1952, by the Gladstone Trustees to the writer of the best essay on a subject connected with either History, or Political Science, or Economics, or with some aspect of British Policy during the period 1815-1914 The Prize is open to undergraduates of the Durham Division and to graduates of that Division of not more than three terms' standing from the degree of B A. The subject for 1952 is "Planning"

THE BISHOP ROBERTSON DIVINITY PRIZE, of the value of £4, is awarded for an essay on a subject chosen by the Professors of Divinity and Hebrew, and is open to students keeping terms either in the Honours School of Theology or for the Diploma in Theology. Candidates must have been in residence during the preceding Easter Term.

THE HOW PRIZE, of books to the value of about £5, is awarded on the result of the Final Honours Examination in Classical and General Literature Between candidates of equal attainment preference will be given to the one reaching the most creditable standard in Verse Composition.

THE EVE MYRA KISCH PRIZE is awarded annually for proficiency in music to a student reading for the Degree of B A. with Honours in Music.

A BOOK PRIZE is awarded to every student who is placed in the First Class in his or her Final Honours Examination, or in the First Division of the Final General or Final Pass Examination.

REGULATIONS OF THE DURHAM COLLEGES

I.

RESIDENCE.

1 Members of the University *in statu pupillari* resident in the Durham Division who are members of any College or Licensed Hall of Residence shall reside within the precincts of that College or Hall unless leave to reside elsewhere has been given by the Head of the College or Hall

2 Members of the University *in statu pupillari* who are not members of any College or Hall shall either reside with their parents or in houses or lodgings approved by the Principal of St Cuthbert's Society (for men) or the Principal of St Aidan's Society (for women)

3 No student may migrate from one body of students to another unless such migration is approved by the Warden of the Durham Colleges

II

DISCIPLINE.

1 Members of the University *in statu pupillari* resident in the Durham Division shall conform to the Regulations of the College, Hall or Society to which they belong

2 They shall wear academic dress at services in the Cathedral, at lectures, on all official occasions and in all public places after dusk

3 The Warden shall define the disciplinary duties of the University Policemen, who shall report to him any breach of discipline or decorum which may come to their notice

4 The Warden may rusticate or inflict any less punishment not amounting to expulsion upon a student guilty of misconduct. He may, with the approval of the Council, expel such a student from the Durham Division

The Head of a College or Hall and the Principal of a Society shall have the right to remove a student from his College, Hall or Society, and shall forthwith report such action to the Warden

III.

KEEPING OF TERMS.

1 All members of the Durham Division of the University *in statu pupillari* are required to keep term —

(a) by satisfactory attendance at the classes prescribed,

and

(b) by attendance at the Collections prescribed.

For Pass and General Students and for Honours students in the subsidiary subjects of their First Year, attendance at three-quarters of the prescribed classes in each subject will be required of every student who has not resided for three terms.

In the case of Honours students who have not resided for three terms, their attendance at classes in their Honours subjects will be regarded as satisfactory if either —

(a) they have attended three-quarters of the prescribed classes in each subject, or

(b) the Head of the Department, after consultation with the teachers concerned, certifies that the student's attendance has been satisfactory.

In order to keep term, a student shall reside in College or in his licensed lodgings for at least three-quarters of the total number of nights in any term. No student shall be absent from his College or licensed lodgings for any night during term time without leave from the Head of his House.

The different Faculties have regulations about attendance at courses, and students must also comply with these regulations.

2. A student shall be excused from attendance on the ground of illness on the evidence of a written statement from the competent College authority.

3 If a member of the Durham Division of the University has been prevented by illness or other urgent cause from keeping any term, application that such term be granted may be made to Senate by the Academic Board, provided that not more than one term be so applied for on behalf of any individual in any one academical year.

IV.

ATTENDANCE AT LECTURES.

1. Every resident member of the Durham Division *in statu pupillari* who has paid the terminal tuition fee demanded shall be admitted to any lecture in the ordinary course of instruction without further payment.

2. Any other person may, by leave of the Academic Board, be admitted to any particular course or courses of lectures on paying to the Treasurer of the Durham Colleges such fee as shall be directed.

3. Any teacher shall have the right to exclude any person from his class, but an appeal shall lie to the Academic Board of the Durham Division, whose decision shall be final.

THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY.

Librarian . DAVID GOUDIE RAMAGE. M.A.

Sub-Librarian FRANK JAMES HARDING, M C , M.A., B.Litt.

The Library contains more than 100,000 volumes and its buildings include the former Bishoprick Law Courts dating from 1450 and Bishop Cosin's Library, from 1668. The special collections include those formed by Bishop Cosin, Dr Routh, Bishop Maltby and Dr Winterbottom, and the Library possesses many fine ancient bindings, 173 incunabula, 214 bound volumes of manuscripts and at least 500 unbound documents. Modern books are added at the rate of more than 4,000 volumes per annum. About 400 periodicals and series are taken. A selection of new books is shown near the entrance to the Library just before they are shelved, and there are author catalogues of all the books and a select classified index. Books may be borrowed from other libraries through the Northern Regional Library Bureau. There is a "viewer" for reading microfilms. The Oriental Section of the Library (c 8,000 volumes) is housed at 29, Old Elvet, under the care of Mr I J C Foster. Access to the Library is open to all members of the University and to other persons on application to the Librarian.

The Science Library, housed at the Science Laboratories, South Road, contains more than 14,000 volumes and pamphlets. These are mainly modern scientific books and journals, although there is a small collection of old and rare books. Access to the Library is open to all members of the University staff, to all Science students, and to other students on application to the Secretary of the Science Laboratories.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS.

I.

TIMES OF OPENING.

1. During term the Library will be open for general use on week-days from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, also from 2 p.m. to 6-30 p.m.

2. During vacation the Library will, subject to the following provision, be open on week-days from 9-30 a.m. till 12-30 p.m.

3. The Library will not be open for general use from December 24th to January 1st inclusive, from the Thursday before Easter to the Thursday following Easter inclusive, on Whit Monday, and from August 1st to August 31st inclusive.

II.

THE USE OF THE LIBRARY

1 The following persons are entitled to borrow books from the Library —

- i Resident matriculated students of the Durham Division of the University and also such students of the Newcastle Division as are recommended by members of the University staff
- ii Members of the teaching staff and administrative officers of the University and of its Divisions
- iii Members of the teaching staff and administrative officers of the Colleges and licensed Halls of Residence in the University
- iv Curators of the Library and members of any Statutory Body in the University
- v Members of the Cathedral Chapter
- vi Persons on whom special borrowing rights have been conferred by the Curators

2 Any graduate of the University is entitled to borrow books on registering his permanent address with the Librarian

3 The Curators may permit other persons to borrow books from the Library on payment of an annual subscription of one guinea.

4 The Librarian may permit members of the administrative staff of the Durham Division or of any of the Durham Colleges to borrow books from the Library

5 In special circumstances the Librarian may grant temporary borrowing rights to other persons

III

RESTRICTIONS ON THE USE OF THE LIBRARY.

1. No book marked "Confined to the Library" may be borrowed.

2 Books from the Routh, Winterbottom, Maltby and Bishop Cosin collections may be borrowed only with the permission of the Librarian.

3. Current numbers of periodicals may not be borrowed.

4 Unbound numbers of periodicals and loose maps may be borrowed only with the permission of the Librarian.

5 Books and MSS deposited in the Strong Room of the Library may not be borrowed, but may be consulted in the Library on application to the Librarian

6 Permission to work in the rooms housing the special collections (Routh, Winterbottom, Maltby and Cosin) must be obtained from the Librarian

IV

• LIMITATION OF THE RIGHT TO BORROW BOOKS

• 1 No student in residence may have in his or her possession at one time more than seven volumes from the Library

2 No member of the teaching staff may have in his or her possession at one time more than fifteen volumes from the Library.

3 No other borrower may have in his or her possession at one time more than three volumes from the Library

4 In special cases permission to borrow additional volumes may be given by the Librarian

V.

THE PERIOD FOR WHICH BOOKS MAY BE RETAINED BY BORROWERS

1a. During term, students may keep each borrowed book for fourteen days and may renew the borrowing for a further fourteen days if the book is not required

1b During vacation, students may borrow books under such conditions as the Librarian may prescribe

1c The Librarian may restrict the period of loan of certain books for special reasons

2 A member of the teaching staff who has retained a borrowed book for longer than fourteen days must return it when it is recalled for the use of another member of the staff or a student.

3 Other borrowers may keep a book for three weeks unless it be recalled. This period may be extended by special permission of the Librarian

VI.

ANNUAL RECALL OF BOOKS.

The Librarian shall recall all books borrowed by members of the teaching staff for inspection during the month of May

VII.

PENALTIES.

1 A borrower who fails to fill up a slip for any book borrowed by him shall be liable to a fine of five shillings

2 A borrower who takes out more than the permitted number of books shall be liable to a fine of two shillings and sixpence for each book so taken out

3 A borrower who loses a volume shall be required to replace it or to pay its estimated value

4 A borrower shall be held responsible for any damage sustained by a volume while in his or her possession. He shall be required to pay for its repair, or, if it be beyond repair, to pay its estimated value

5 A borrower who retains a volume beyond the permitted period shall be liable to a fine of twopence for each day its return is overdue. If overdue books are returned within one day of the date on the date-slip, the fine will be reduced to one penny per volume. Fine cards are sent out once a week, on Thursdays, but fines are due from the date marked on the slip inserted in each book issued. A borrower who retains a book beyond the time-limit for vacation borrowing is liable to a fine of one shilling per volume in addition to the standard rate of fines

6 A borrower who disregards a request for the recall of a volume shall be liable to a fine of one shilling for each day up to a maximum of five shillings.

7 Any user of the Library who causes wilful damage to books or other Library property may be debarred from the use of the Library, and his offence shall be reported to the Curators, who may inflict a fine or other penalty upon him at their discretion.

8. Any reader who brings a bottle of ink into the Library shall be liable to a fine of five shillings, and shall be held responsible for any damage caused thereby.

VIII

GENERAL.

1 Silence must be kept at all times in all the reading rooms of the Library.

2 All readers *in statu pupillari* must observe in the Library the University rule about the wearing of academical dress.

3 If books have been exposed to infections during the period of borrowing, the borrower shall notify the Librarian to this effect before returning the books to the Library

• 4 Tracings may not be taken from maps, plans, etc., except by express permission of the Librarian.

5 Attaché cases, or similar articles, may not be taken into the Library

6. Smoking is prohibited in the reading rooms and book stores of the Library Any student found smoking may be fined at the discretion of the Librarian

7. Any breach of the Library regulations may be reported by the Librarian to the proper authority.

NOTE —All undergraduates on beginning to use the Library must sign their names in the Librarian's register

DURHAM COLLEGES RESEARCH FUND

This fund is administered by a standing Committee of the Academic Board, and all University teachers in the Durham Division as well as other members of staff of appropriate academic standing, and post-graduate students who have been engaged in research for a year, are eligible for grants. The Council of the Durham Colleges allocates £500 annually to the Fund. The Research Fund Committee is prepared to make grants to cover or give assistance towards the cost of specific investigations. The terms and conditions under which grants may be made and other information may be obtained from the Secretary to the Durham Colleges, 38, North Bailey, Durham.

EXTRA-MURAL STUDIES.

Director : H J BOYDEN, B A , B Sc (Econ) London, J P.

The Department provides Courses in English and Foreign Literatures, History, International Affairs, Economics, Political Theory, Psychology, Philosophy, Theology, Biology, Archaeology, Geology, Music, Art, Law

Societies or groups of students may ask the Director for a tutor in any of these subjects and, where there is sufficient public demand, a class can be formed. The syllabus is decided in consultation with the students. All classes are open to the public.

The Courses vary from a Tutorial class meeting for twenty-four evenings in each of three years to a short Extension Lecture Course of six meetings. A Tutorial class provides for close personal supervision of the students writing and reading by the tutor, the Extension Lecture Courses meet the requirements of a larger audience. During vacations, residential and non-residential Courses are provided to cater for a wide variety of subjects and students.

The tutors consist of members of the Internal Staff of the University of Durham, other graduates appointed by the Extra-Mural Board for this particular kind of work and the Department's Staff Tutors, one of whom is resident in Weardale and another in Teesdale.

DURHAM UNIVERSITY CONTINGENT OF THE UNIVERSITY TRAINING CORPS.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Durham University Contingent of the University Training Corps forms part of the Territorial Army. Its chief function is to provide pre-service military training for students who have deferred their national service.

Under the National Service Act of 1947, personnel discharging their national service obligations in the Army are required to perform a period of whole-time training in the active Army followed by a period of part-time training in the Territorial Army. Cadets serving in the University Training Corps before being called up for national service are allowed remission of up to 40 per cent of the training required of them during part-time service.

DEFERRED STUDENTS

• The University Training Corps provides facilities whereby deferred students may undertake their basic military training while in residence and also appear before a War Office Selection Board for consideration as potential officers. This facility makes it possible for students to begin specialised training immediately on entering whole-time service. It also enables them to serve in commissioned rank for the greater part of their service.

CONDITIONS OF SERVICE

Cadets are attested and enlisted into the Territorial Army for not less than two and not more than four years. On completing his engagement, or on leaving the University a cadet, if he so desires, may be discharged from the Territorial Army.

Enlisted cadets receive full Territorial Army entitlements and privileges, including bounty, travelling expenses and Army rates of pay during continuous training.

OBLIGATIONS

Recruits 40 training periods, each of one hour, and 15 days continuous training in the year.

Trained Cadets 30 training periods and 15 days continuous training each year.

In addition all cadets are required each year to fire a course on the range.

DURHAM UNIVERSITY AIR SQUADRON.

Headquarters . 7, Windsor Crescent, Jesmond,

PURPOSE.

The purpose of University Air Squadrons is to provide training during their University career for members of the Universities who wish to prepare themselves for commissioned service in the Royal Air Force or in the R A F Auxiliary and Reserve Forces, or in the regular or auxiliary air forces of the Dominions, and are prepared to give time to this training. The squadrons are also designed to provide a serious interest in flying and the problems associated with it, and to promote and maintain liaison with the Universities in technical and research problems affecting aviation

MEMBERSHIP

Membership of University Air Squadrons is open to the following classes of undergraduates —

- Class 1 (a) those without previous service in H M Forces, excluding those already provisionally selected for permanent commissions in the R A F (see Classes 3 and 4).
- Class 1 (b) those who have served in H M Forces or Dominion Forces who have not reached the basic standard of pilot training, excluding those already provisionally selected for permanent commissions in the R A F
- Class 2 (a) qualified pilots (up to full R A F wings standard) who have served in H M Forces or Dominion Forces, who have not already been provisionally selected for permanent commissions in the R.A F.
- Class 2 (b) those who have served in H M Forces or Dominion Forces who are not qualified pilots but have reached the basic standard of pilot training, who have not already been provisionally selected for permanent commissions in the R.A F
- Class 3 those who have been provisionally selected for permanent commissions in the R A F under the provisions of A P 904 who are qualified pilots or have reached the basic standard of pilot training

Class 4 those who have been provisionally selected for permanent commissions in the R.A.F. who are not qualified pilots or have not reached the basic standard of pilot training

Note (i) The liabilities of an undergraduate for call up for whole-time national service under the National Service Acts, 1948, will not be altered by his joining a University Air Squadron

(ii) The service of an undergraduate as a member of a University Air Squadron after completion of whole-time national service will count in lieu of an equivalent period of part-time national service which he would otherwise be required to serve under the National Service Acts, 1948

• Full information may be obtained from the Commanding Officer.

STUDENTS' ACTIVITIES.

1. STUDENTS' REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL

In each College there is a Junior Common Room which controls student affairs within that college and elects representatives to the central Durham Colleges Students' Representative Council. This Council is the body recognised for representing student opinion and for presenting the views of students to the Academic Board and Council through the Warden.

The Council also manages and controls the undergraduate newspaper and literary magazine, and arranges student activities other than those organised by individual Colleges. It also provides an annual conference for freshmen before the beginning of the Michaelmas Term.

2 UNION SOCIETIES.

In addition to the Students' Representative Council there are two Union Societies—the Durham Union Society (for men) and the Durham Women's Union Society (for women). Membership of these Societies, which is optional, is open to all men and women students respectively, on payment of a small subscription, and a majority of students are members of the appropriate Society.

The main function of the Union Society, which was founded in 1842, is the organisation of debates and lectures by outside speakers, but the Society provides in addition numerous club facilities for its members. The Society's premises, which are on Palace Green, include a debating hall, a coffee bar, a reading room, writing room and committee room. Members of the Society also have reciprocal privileges with the following Societies—Oxford Union Society, Cambridge Union Society, Edinburgh University Union, Manchester University Union, St Andrew's University Union, King's College Union Society, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Dublin College Historical Society, Dublin University Philosophical Society.

The Women's Union Society also arranges debates and lectures by outside speakers, and its members have the use of a building containing a cloakroom and two common rooms in No. 44, North Bailey, as well as the right to use the Union Society's coffee bar.

3 SPORTS ORGANISATION

All the Colleges have separate Athletic Clubs of their own, which compete against each other for inter-collegiate trophies, but the major sports organisation is on a divisional basis controlled by the Durham Colleges Athletic Union, which includes the Captains of all sports and a representative of each College. The University playing fields, covering about 20 acres, are situated on the Race-course beside the river and include a cricket ground, a rugby football ground, two Association football pitches and three hockey pitches as well as a number of tennis courts. The fields are managed on behalf of Council by the Board of Management of University Playing Fields, which consists of the Treasurer and the Secretary of the Durham Colleges and the student President of the Durham Colleges Athletic Union. The construction of a further playing field on a 14 acre site at Houghall, also on the banks of the river but about three-quarters of a mile further up-stream, has begun. It is hoped that these fields will be ready for use by 1953.
